North End Nursing Home Update

As promised, a petition has been drawn up to protest the planned closing of the North End Nursing Home and demand action by our elected officials. It is circulating the neighborhood for signatures and reads as follows:


Petition Summary and Background

The North End community recently discovered Partners HealthCare plans to close the Spaulding Nursing and Rehab Center (formerly the North End Nursing Home) at 70 Fulton Street, Boston, MA 02113. The decision to close this facility was made without any input from the community or concern for the impact on the long-term residents who make their home there and receive daily visits from family members who are unable to travel easily to locations outside the neighborhood.

Actions Petitioned for

We, the undersigned, are concerned citizens who urge our elected officials to act now to 1) hold public hearings on the fate of the property (aka Parcel C-2-42A under an LDA with the BRA requiring use as a nursing home) pursuant to Massachusetts DPH regulations, 2) commission an independent review of Partners' analysis of the relative conditions of the current facility and the Wingate facility they plan to purchase and renovate, and 3) facilitate second opinions on the health impact of moving individual residents.

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health regulations referenced are contained in Section 275 of Chapter 165 of the Acts of 2014, reading as follows: **Chapter 165**

An act making appropriations for the fiscal year 2015 for the maintenance of the departments, boards, commissions, institutions and certain activities of the commonwealth, for interest, sinking fund and serial bond requirements and for certain permanent improvements

Section 275 of chapter 165 of the acts of 2014 (fy15 gaa) issues the following mandate:

The department of public health shall amend the licensure procedure and suitability requirements for long term care facilities to implement a hearing process that would precede approval of and allow for public input on any application for a license, notice of intent for transfer of ownership or notice of intent to sell or close any skilled nursing facility whether for profit or nonprofit.

In a related topic, Mayor Walsh's rescheduled Coffee Hour for the North End will take place in Christopher Columbus Park on Wednesday, June 29th, at 9:30 am. The initial announcement described these "Neighborhood Coffee Hours" as a way to "give residents a unique opportunity to speak directly with [the mayor] and other city officials about needs in their neighborhoods." Recently, there have been unconfirmed rumors that the mayor will not actually take questions at this event, but only allow residents to place written suggestions in a suggestion box. This would seem to fly in the face of the whole reason for the event! Mayor Walsh may choose not to answer questions, but we can certainly ask them. I expect more than a few will be about our Nursing Home ...



THE CHARACTER OF ROMAN STRUCTURES


The shape, nature or characteristics of all structures that have been built at any time or place in history have been influenced by their geographic location, geology, climate, religious beliefs, and social attitudes. Understanding these influences is a prerequisite to an understanding of the architecture of any country.

Roman building was influenced by the availability of marble, materials for making brick, chalky deposit called tufa (which also made excavations for the catacombs practical), excellent sand and gravel, a clean earth called pozzolana which helped in making a strong and durable concrete, and by exposure to the work of Phidias and the "golden age" of Athens.

The Greeks had developed a civilization of the highest order. When the Romans conquered the Greeks, they brought many Greeks back to Rome and used them as servants and tutors. These tutors and the high degree of Greek cultural development greatly influenced all of Roman life including their architecture.

An order of architecture is a column sitting on its base and

the horizontal structure above it which is called the entablature. The Greeks developed three orders of architecture. These are called Doric, Ionic and Corinthian and were used as structural elements as well as decorative features. Structure and ornament were blended into one.

For example, the columns that held up the structure were also the predominant decorative feature. Removal of the columns would cause serious structural problems. The Classical Greeks spent about five hundred years working on and improving all

features of their temples, such as the thickness, height, and spacing of the columns and the curvature of all horizontal and vertical lines to correct optical illusion. It is said that the typical Greek Temple was mans' most nearly perfect creation.

When the Romans conquered the Greeks, they accepted and used the Doric, Ionic and Corinthian Orders but added two more of their own design. These two are called the Tuscan, which is not fluted, and the Composite, which is a combination of Ionic and Corinthian.

The Romans generally built their buildings first and then applied the orders as decoration later. Parts of structures are still standing even though the decorative features were removed centuries ago. The two very important structural contributions made by the Romans were the use of concrete and the employment of the arch to cover large areas, thus bringing the element of space into their architecture. They didn't invent the arch but were the first to use it to any great extent.

The Long Struggle for Independence

The American Revolutionary War began on April 19, 1775, a date celebrated as a public holiday — **Patriots' Day** — in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the State of Maine. The war became a fight for independence with the July 1776 adoption, by the Americans' Continental Congress, of the *Declaration of Independence*.

As you celebrate Independence Day weekend next week culminating in the free concert and fireworks spectacular at the Charles River Esplanade – remember that independence did not come easily. The war took seven years, with major battles as late as 1781. When, on July 18, 1776, two weeks after the signing, the Declaration of Independence finally completed the long trek on the roads of the day from Philadelphia for the first public reading in Boston, it was not at all inevitable that we Americans would win independence from Great Britain. No one had heard of such a thing as a colony throwing off its mother country. And the idea that untrained volunteer farmer/soldiers would defeat the best professional army and navy in the world was nearly inconceivable.

Coming to the aid of the American cause were the Kingdom of France, the Dutch Republic, and the Kingdom of Spain. Provisional Articles of Peace were signed in Paris on November 30, 1782. The final Treaty was signed on September 3, 1783. It was ratified by Congress on January 14, 1784, and by the King of Great Britain on April 9,

The American Revolutionary 1784. Ratification documents were exchanged in Paris on May date celebrated as a public 12, 1784.

The American negotiators, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, and John Jay, secured from one of the largest and most sophisticated world powers a treaty which contained not only an unconditional acknowledgment of American independence, but also important provisions establishing the territory of the United States as stretching from Canada to Florida and from the Atlantic to the Mississippi. American commercial interests were protected by a provision for Americans to continue to fish the waters of the Atlantic off Canada.

The Revolution began with noble sentiment — We hold these Truths to be self-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness. It ended with a legal agreement over boundaries and fishing rights. Such is the unchanging course of human events. Noble sentiments are good, even necessary, but they have to be backed up by practical texts. So, having ended the war with the Treaty of Paris in 1783, the next big step for the young nation, in 1787, was to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty — by drafting and adopting our Constitution.

Saint Marianne Cope

Saint Marianne Cope, also known as Saint Marianne of Molokai, was born on January 23, 1838, in Heppenheim, in what was then the Grand Duchy of Hesse, which is today part of Germany.

She was baptized Maria Anna Barbara Koob, which was later anglicized to Cope. Her parents were Peter Koob (1787-1862) and Barbara Witzenbacher (1803-1872). The year after her birth, the family emigrated to the United States, settling in Utica, New York. By the time she was in eighth grade, her father had become an invalid. As the oldest child, Maria left school to work in a textile factory to help support her family.

Her father passed away in 1862. Shortly after his passing, Maria left the factory to pursue a religious life. She became a novice of the Sisters of the Third Order Regular of Saint Francis, based in Syracuse, New York. She took the name Marianne when she completed her formation.

After profession, in November of the next year, Sister Marianne began teaching at Assumption parish school.

Sister Marianne held the post of superior in several places and



was twice the novice mistress of her congregation. A natural leader, three different times she was superior of St. Joseph's Hospital in Syracuse, where she learned much that would be useful during her years in Hawaii.

Elected provincial in 1877, Mother Marianne was unanimously re-elected in 1881. Two years later, the Hawaiian government was searching for someone to run the Kakaako Receiving Station outside Honolulu, on the island of Oahu where lepers from the other islands were sent. She also opened a hospital and a school for girls.

In 1888, Mother Marianne and two sisters went to Molokai to open a home for women and girls. The Hawaiian government was quite hesitant to send women for this difficult assignment. They need not have worried about Mother Marianne; she changed life on Molokai by introducing cleanliness, pride, and fun to the colony. Bright scarves and pretty dresses for the women were part of her approach. On Molokai, she $took\, charge\, of the\, home\, that$ St. Damien de Veuster had established for men

and boys.

Awarded the Royal Order of Kapiolani by the Hawaiian government and celebrated in a poem by Robert Louis Stevenson, Mother Marianne continued her work faithfully. Her sisters have attracted vocations among the Hawaiian people and still work on Molokai.

Mother Marianne died on August 9, 1918, and was beatified in 2005 and canonized seven years later. Saint Marianne Cope's Feast Day is January 23rd.







L'Anno Bello: A Year in Italian Folklore

A Most Fruitful Summer

Ah, summer — the time of vivid sunshine, warm breezes, and days spent relaxing at the beach. It is also the time when I crave fresh fruit the most. The early summer crops of June boast some of the juiciest, most succulent fruit around. What constitutes summer if not a big bite out of a fire-engine red watermelon, its pulp disintegrating into a sweet and refreshing drink? What else can brighten June mornings like a pile of gem-hued strawberries artfully scattered over cereal or pancakes? What about the clinking of ice cubes floating in a glass of peach or cherry juice — doesn't the mere thought of such a drink bring relief on a stiflingly humid day? Yes, summer fruits have always appealed to me, which is why I was both delighted and surprised to find that they contain a wealth of folklore and superstitions woven between their stems and vines. So let us embark on a journey of taste and the sort of lore that has been handed down from our ancestors, originating from the days when agriculture formed the backbone of almost every society.

1) Cherries: I love to bake with cherries. Their tartness perfectly accentuates sweet cakes and muffins. On Memorial Day, I even made a fruit crisp with a blend of peaches and cherries, and it was simply

sublime. If people loved cherries so much that they wanted to guarantee a good crop of them, a Swiss superstition states that the first cherry of a tree must be eaten by a woman who recently gave birth to her first child — hopefully, the woman's fertility would rub off on the tree and ensure a plethora of fruit for the next harvest. Meanwhile, Italian author Andrea Malossini asserts that it is lucky to find a twin cherry, or two cherries sharing a single stem. Another Italian proverb states "Giugno ciliege a pugno," meaning that June has an abundance of cherries!

2) Strawberries: Did you happen to notice the full moon on June 20th? If you did indeed catch a glimpse of the moon, you would have seen what is called the Full Strawberry Moon. The Algonquin tribes knew June's full moon as such because it coincided with the time that strawberries were ripe for gathering. A quaint legend states that if a person breaks a double strawberry (two strawberries that somehow grew together in one) in half and shares it with another person, the two will be destined to fall in love. There is still some debate about how strawberries got their name. One version states that the little vellow seeds resembled flecks of straw, while another

popular theory declares that the shoots of the plant would often be dispersed around the ground, leading the fruit to develop a name that derives from the Anglo-Saxon word for "strewn." In Italy, strawberries are known as *fragole* and grow wild. They are enjoyed drizzled over panna cotta or marinated in balsamic syrup.

3) Peaches: Peaches are excellent in juices, in pies and just plain cut up in delectable slices. I know it is summer when I can smell peaches in the air. It was once believed that eating a peach would impart wisdom. They are also thought to bring longevity and keep evil spirits at bay — not bad for a fruit found readily in supermarkets everywhere! In China, the country to which the fruit is native, peaches are closely associated with immortality and divinity. This is because the blossoms of the peach tree appear before the leaves do, an unusual occurrence. As such, the Chinese will often adorn doorways and gates with peach wood to drive away malevolent forces and attract good luck. In Italy, peach, or pesca, is a popular flavor for marmalades, jams and pastries.

4) Melons: Yes, watermelons are the quintessential summertime fruit for us in the United States, emblems of relaxation and hot weather. However, among the Romani people of the Balkans, watermelons have a far stranger connotation — vampires! According to folklore, a watermelon left alone at night on the full moon has the potential to turn into a vampire, rolling around and scaring townspeople. The full moon also features in an Italian superstition about melons. Andrea Malossini writes that melons will grow fatter and fuller if planted under the full moon in March. Perhaps the hope is that they will grow to resemble the moon! For me, summer always meant my father bringing home and breaking open a fresh cantaloupe from an Italian market, revealing the sunny orange hue within. How I love these summer meloni!

So there you go, a sweet bevy of fruit folklore and superstition. Hopefully this adds more curiosity and wonder to your enjoyment of Earth's bounty during the summer months. Enjoy a season of fresh fruit and healthy eating — but please, keep an eye on any melons left out overnight!

Mass Shooters, Mental Illness, Psychopaths and Treatment?

When it comes to mental illness, most people live in denial. However, what most Americans think about mental illness isn't even true. When it comes to describing mass shooters as mentally ill, the facts don't support it. Whenever a mass shooter strikes, folks come on TV (President Obama has done it plenty of times) tying them to the lack of treatment for the mentally ill. The polls show the same thing. Most Americans could very well believe in myths about violence and the mentally

I worked 41 years in the field of mental health in both support services and direct care. I served 28 of those years with the Department of Mental Health as a police officer. While many Americans believe mass shooters are mentally ill, criminologists and psychiatrists say not necessarily so.

As a police officer, I have worked with both the mentally ill who had serious conditions such as schizophrenia, delusions, and psychoses who can be helped with treatment, as well as many folks with antisocial sociopathic disorders. These folks lack empathy, can be very callous and have no sense of right or wrong. To them, all that matters is not getting caught. Some of these characters are truly scary. Full of rage bottled up inside, they are unpredictable most of the time. Many times people use terms like bad seeds, or the face of evil. In reality, these folks are lurking in the shadows and can pounce at will.

Early in my career, I learned

the differences between the two. I know a sociopath when I see one; the years I spent working in this population educated me as to those differences.

As a police officer, I had to deal with the severely mentally ill, sociopaths, and psychopaths. Given a choice, I felt safer with psychosis than with someone who had no sense of right and wrong (psychopaths).

Michael McDermott, who killed seven people, and Nidal Hasan, who killed 13 soldiers, were not mentally ill. However, the Virginia Tech shooter was mentally ill. Most vicious killers aren't mentally ill and there isn't a pill for those folks to get well.

We live surrounded by sociopaths and don't even know it or recognize it. There are also various degrees of having anti-social behavior. Once, as a police officer, I was rescued from serious harm with the assistance of a sociopath who ran for help. I remember I thanked him afterwards. A psychiatrist told me I shouldn't have thanked him. I told the doctor, it wasn't your neck getting crushed, was it?

Our society runs risks every day, but there isn't always a magic pill to fix everyone. To blame those with mental illness for all the mass shootings is unfair.

As far as law enforcement goes, we need more treatment for most, and confinement for the violent sociopaths waiting to strike when the urge hits. Knowing the difference between the two groups isn't as important as staying alert and aware of what is out there.



National Transportation Groups Push for Fingerprinting of Drivers

In Unified Policy Stance on Passenger Safety, Two Major Transportation Industry Trade Groups Say All For-Hire **Drivers Must be Fingerprinted**

The National Limousine Association (NLA) and the Taxicab, Limousine & Paratransit Association (TLPA), North America's two largest professional trade associations in the for-hire passenger transportation business, jointly announced a unified position today calling for all drivers who transport passengers for a fee to be subject to national fingerprint-based background checks. The stance is aimed at ensuring the highest standards in vetting the nation's hundreds of thousands of forhire drivers, and to ensure that universal practices to maximize passenger safety are instituted

and upheld. The vast majority of drivers within fleets operated by NLA and TLPA members in large to mid-sized cities must pass a fingerprint-based background check before they can transport passengers. However, in nearly every market, services such as Uber and Lyft do not use a fingerprint-based method to vet their drivers.

"There simply is no substitute for a fingerprint-based background check. You can fake a name or a social security number, but fingerprints don't lie. The numerous news reports of dangerous drivers for Uber and Lyft are reason enough to call for common-sense safety precautions, and that starts with fingerprints," said Dwight Kines, President of the TLPA.

"For years, many sectors of business, from daycare centers to commercial airlines, have relied on fingerprint-based background checks to verify the accuracy and authenticity of security screenings," said Gary Buffo, President of the NLA. "The TLPA and NLA believe that we must exhaust all feasible avenues to make certain that the people behind the wheels of commercial ground transportation vehicles are indeed who they claim to be. Thanks to recent technological advances, fingerprint background checks are more widely available and accessible than ever before, and

Let's Talk Outdoor Furniture Care ...

It's that time of the year when all outdoor furniture comes out of hibernation. Here are a few tips on caring for your outdoor furniture.

Mold (the enemy): depending on the material, scrub or sand lightly. Always wear gloves, and discard any used supplies to avoid spreading spores.

Protection: if you can't store your furniture indoors, purchase a good strong cover to protect it from the elements.



Wood furniture: scrub the area with a soft-bristle brush, and rinse. Don't use chlorine bleach, which can damage wood fibers. You can also seal with a clear polyurethane or stain, maybe to a deeper shade.

Most outdoor wood furniture resists decay and can withstand the elements. If wood is left unfinished, the wood acquires a silvery-gray patina and requires little maintenance.



Wicker furniture: Because of the weave, this gets a little tricky. The best way to remove dirt and debris from wicker is to use a vacuum's dust-brush attachment or a



a mild soap solution. Scrub and rinse, avoid using too much water. Wicker can also be repainted. Sand to remove

dry paintbrush. Clean with

any loose paint and either use a brush or spray paint. I have done this in the past, and it comes out looking like new a piece of furniture. Try changing the color for a new look!



Metal furniture: Use a mild soap solution, and scrub, rinse, and dry as described. To remove rust stains or mold, sand the area lightly. Wipe it clean, and apply touch-up paint if needed. Again this is the time to change the color for a new look!

Bob Dylan and Mavis Staples ... are making a stop on their U.S. tour at Tanglewood on Saturday, July 2nd.

Tanglewood will welcome Bob Dylan with special guest Mavis Staples to the Koussevitzky Music Shed. The legendary singersongwriter has performed twice at this venue, first in 1991, and again during the 1997 season. Dylan had reached out to Staples about joining his tour and, having worked together before, the artist couldn't resist the appeal of a summer spent on stage with the fabled musician.

Bob Dylan has been influential in popular music and culture for more than five decades. Much of his most celebrated work dates from the 1960s when his songs chronicled social unrest (although Dylan repudiated suggestions from journalists that he was a spokesman for his generation). Nevertheless, early songs such as "Blowin in the Wind" and "The Times are a Changin" became anthems for the American civil rights and anti-war movements. After he left his initial base in the American Folk Music Revival, his six-minute single "Like a Rolling Stone" altered the range of popular music in 1965. His mid-1960s recordings, backed by rock musicians, reached the top end of the United States music charts while also attracting denunciation and criticism from others in the folk movement.

Dylan has published six books of drawings and paintings, and his work has been exhibited in major art galleries. As a musician, Dylan has sold more than 100 million records, making him one of the best-selling art-

ists of all times. Dylan has been inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, Minnesota Music Hall of Fame, Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame, and Songwriters Hall of Fame. The Pulitzer Prize jury in 2008 awarded him a special citation for "his profound impact on popular music and American culture, marked by lyrical compositions of extraordinary poetic power." In May 2012, Dylan received the Presidential Medal of Freedom from President Barak Obama.

Mavis Staples began her career with her family group in

1950. Initially singing locally at churches and appearing on a weekly radio show, the Staples scored a hit in 1956 with "Uncloudy Day" for the Vee-Jay

With Mavis' voice and leader/dad Pops' songs, singing, and guitar playing, the Staples evolved from enormously popular gospel singers (with recordings on United and Riverside as well as Vee-Jay) to become the most spectacular and influential spirituality-based group in America. By the mid-1960s The Staple Singers, inspired by Pops' close friendship with Martin Luther King Jr., became the spiritual and musical voices of the civil rights movement. They covered contemporary pop hits

with positive messages, including Bob Dylan's "A Hard Rain's Gonna Fall," and a version of Stephen Stills "For What it's Worth."

During a December 20th, 2008, appearance on National Public Radio news show Wait Wait ... Don't Tell ME!, Staples was asked about her past personal relationship with Dylan. She admitted they "were good friends, yes indeed" and that he had asked her father for her hand in marriage.

With two iconic voices on one stage, with a possibility of romantic chemistry, it's a performance not to be missed. These two powerful music legends will

Donald Trump and his businesses have been involved in at least 3,500 lawsuits in federal and state courts during the past three decades. Lawsuits involve personal defamation claims, battles with patrons of his casinos over their unpaid debts, claims that Trump did not pay contractors, and failed condo projects. So reported USA Today.

"I really look forward to it because I love affection," Fredericks said. "It's my treat."

"Italy is eroding right out from under us," said Paolo Conti. We profess to be proud of our antiquities and our beautiful landscape, yet we are destroying both through incompetence and neglect. Our "violent consumption of land," particularly along our long coastlines, has destabilized the very earth. Engineers build homes and hotels without taking into account the characteristics of the soil and groundwater, and without allowing for rain run-off. Worse, we aren't even properly maintaining the developments we already have. Water leaks into the ground from damaged pipes all across the country. Retaining walls that guard against erosion haven't been kept up and are simply crumbling into the sea. The result is that, of the 700,000 landslides in Europe in recent decades, more than 500,000 occurred here." "Addressing geological risks just isn't a priority in Italy," says Francesco Pedduto, president of the National Council of Geologists. "Our government does virtually nothing to monitor the situation. Instead of spending a minimal amount to prevent disasters, we pay through the nose to respond to them — an average of more than \$3 billion every year over the past 50 years. This 'illogic' is unworthy of Italy. The land is who we are — we mustn't let it wash away."

Bookings by Americans for summer trips to Europe are up 9.3 percent this year from last, according to Allianz Global Assistance, a travelinsurance provider. But many people are staying clear of cities that have been hit by terrorist attacks: Bookings to Brussels, for example, are down 30 percent, and those to Istanbul are down 44 percent. Rome is enjoying a 15 percent increase. Ah, arrivederci Roma!

Thirty-eight percent of registered voters are indifferent about the possibility of Hillary Clinton becoming the first-ever female president. 22 percent expressed "enthusiasm" for that prospect, and 18 percent said it makes them uncomfortable. So reported the Wall Street Journal NBC News.

Holy! Holy! People who attend religious services a couple of times a week may live longer, a new study suggests. Harvard University researchers analyzed data from the Nurses' Health Study, a survey of 74,534 healthy, primarily Christian, women. At the start of the study in 1992, participants were asked how often they went to church; the researchers then tracked them for 20 years. By 2012, 13,537 of the women had died. After adjusting for other risk factors, it turned out that the ones who attended services more than once a week were 33 percent less likely to have died of any cause, than those who never went to church at all. Overall, going to church at least once week was associated with a lifespan increase of about five months. "There is evidence that it provides social support, discourages smoking, decreases depression, and promotes optimism or hope," study author Tyler Vander Weele tells *MedicalDaily.com.* Based on previous research, however, the church effect "may not be as strong for men as it is for women."

It's true! A 64-year-old bank courier recently became the nation's first recipient of a penile transplant. Thomas Manning underwent the complex, 15-hour operation at Massachusetts General Hospital to replace the organ he lost to cancer with one from a deceased donor. Manning says the procedure wasn't necessary to save his life, but rather to restore his sense of self. "I want to go back to being who I was," he tells The New York Times. "If I'm lucky, I get 75 percent of what I used to be." Since his transplant, Manning has had no signs of infection or rejection, but it will be a few more weeks before normal urinary function is restored. Manning's doctors are optimistic that he will regain sexual function within a few months.

Not many of today's Americans are aware that the first African-American elected to the U.S. Senate was Hiram Rhodes Revels, who represented Mississippi in 1870 and 1871, during the Reconstruction era. In an ironic twist, the man who occupied the seat before Revel was Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederacy.

The words, "that all men are created equal" are those of Philip Mazzei.

AMERICA IS A BEAUTIFUL ITALIAN NAME

Parla Come Mangi!

(Speak as You Eat!)

Benvenuti! The enchanting blue-green crystal clear waters washing the sandy beaches of the stunning Sardinian bays are the ideal environment for sardines (sardine), gray mullets (muggini), tuna (tonno) and lobsters (aragoste) to grow. The superior water quality and temperature forms the perfect ecosystem for a local species of sardines so small and tender they can be eaten whole, deep fried or grilled after being generously rubbed in salt. Every August and September, the waters off the coast of *Cabras* on the western part of the island deliver female gray mullets full of eggs. The fish roe is carefully harvested and salted for preservation after which it is pressed into oblong shapes using wooden paddles. The blocks of pressed roe are then left to cure in a well-ventilated, cool room for about 4 months to concentrate the wonderful aroma and taste of the Sardinian sea. Once the characteristic brownish color is achieved, this expensive delicacy known as bottarga di muggine (salted mullet roe) is ready to be sold in select stores next to the less expensive bottarga di tonno (tuna roe). This excellent regional food is a national treasure and considered to be the very best in the world. It can be eaten as an appetizer, thinly sliced and served with bread — or as a pasta condiment crumbled into small pieces and mixed with the finest extra virgin olive oil. The strip of Sardinian coast stretching from the north-western town of Capocaccia down to the city of Alghero and ending with the southern Catalan jewel of a fishing village, Bosa, known for its gorgeous cliffs, creates the ideal habitat for Mediterranean spiny lobsters. Aragoste di scoglio (spiny lobsters or rock lobsters) are different from the New England lobsters we are more familiar with. Spiny lobsters have long thick antennae and do not have the large claws of our local lobsters. Caught in fish traps or nets and delivered fresh, this delicious seafood has its peak season is in May. Sardinian fish and seafood preparation is very simple — the fresh meat has its own wonderful flavor and very few ingredients are needed to enhance the taste. Enjoy making spaghetti all'aragosta and pairing it with a glass of lively fresh Vermentino di Sardegna white wine.

Spaghetti All'Aragosta (Serves Four)

1 small lobster (1 ½ lb)

3-4 tbsp. Extra Virgin Olive Oil 4 garlic cloves, minced

1 onion, diced

1 onion, aicea

4 bay leaves 1 glass of dry white wine Pepper flakes to taste 1 tbsp. chopped parsley 1 cup tomato sauce 14 oz spaghetti Salt

Preparation: Cut the lobster lengthwise and remove the intestine. Cut the meat into small pieces removing the shell where possible. Heat the olive oil in a saucepan and sauté the onion and garlic together. Add the lobster meat and the bay leaves and sauté. Pour in the white wine, the pepper flakes, chopped parsley and tomato sauce and simmer for 30 minutes over a low heat. Cook the spaghetti in plenty of salted boiling water until *al dente*, drain, transfer into the saucepan with the lobster sauce and combine well. Serve right away. *Buon appetito!*

Spaghetti All'Aragosta (Serve Quattro)

1 aragosta (600 grammi circa) 3-4 cucchiai di olio extravergine

di oliva 4 spicchi d'aglio sminuzzati

4 Spicciii a agiio Sinina 1 cinolla sminuzzata

1 cipolla sminuzzata 4 foglie di alloro Peperoncino q.b.
1 cucchiaio di prezzemolo tritato

200 g di sugo di pomodoro 400 g di spaghetti

Sale q.b.

1 bicchiere di vino bianco secco

Preparazione: Taglia l'aragosta nel senso della lunghezza e rimuovi il filamento intestinale. Taglia la carne in piccoli pezzi rimuovendola dal guscio se possibile. In una pentola, scalda l'olio e fai soffriggere la cipolla e l'aglio. Aggiungi l'aragosta in pezzi, le foglie d'alloro e fai saltare il tutto. Aggiungi il vino bianco, il peperoncino, il prezzemolo ed il sugo di pomodoro. Cuoci a fiamma bassa per 30 minuti. Cuoci gli spaghetti al dente in abbondante acqua salata bollente, scolali e trasferiscili nella pentola con il sugo d'aragosta combinando bene il tutto. Servi subito. *Buon appetito!*

A Nostalgic Remembrance



Two weeks ago, when I left off with the story line that had me traveling through Italy, Sal Meli and I had taken our FIAT rental on the ferry that connects Messina and Reggio, Calabria. After visiting ruins from the Roman Empire, I called a friend, Unberto Cristiano, from Belmont, who had returned to Calabria to visit family that summer.

Before leaving the States, Albert (his chosen American first name) gave me his aunt's phone number. When I called, Albert and I made plans to hook up later that day in the only piazza of the town. However, I miscalculated the distance from Reggio to Catanzaro (the capital city of Calabria) and the subsequent distance to Andali, a suburb where his family still lived.

The drive east to Catanzaro was in an easterly direction over a two-lane mountain road. Due to my miscalculations, and the fact that I had to drive slowly through those southern Italian mountains, we arrived two hours late. When we arrived at the fountain in the center of the piazza, I didn't see Albert. There were three men standing near the fountain dressed in suits and ties. One wore a sash with green, white, and red stripes, the colors of the Italian flag. They looked at us for a second or two and then turned away. Not seeing my friend, I had Sal jump out and ask the men if they knew Albert and, if they did, his whereabouts at that point in time. The man wearing the sash looked at Sal and then me behind the wheel and asked if we were the Americans who were friends of Albert? Sal replied that we were his American friends and the three men then just stared at us. After a few seconds, one of the men began yelling, "The Americans are here!" over and over again.

The piazza began to fill up with people coming out of the buildings that surrounded the town square. They looked at us with the same curiosity as did the three men who were waiting for us, initially. We were then told by the man with the sash (he turned out to be the mayor of Andali) that Albert had to take care of some business that day and, seeing that we didn't show up at the agreed upon meeting time, he had asked the mayor to greet his friends. I apologized for being late explaining that I had miscalculated the distance. The mayor then said that no apology was necessary and we were to join him for coffee and wait for Albert to return.

I parked near a café where we were told to wait and sat at an outside table with the mayor and his two companions. After ordering espresso (Italians don't drink cappuccino after 11:00 am), I asked the men why everyone was looking at us so strangely. The man began to explain that, to them, we didn't look like Americans. He went on to explain that not too many tourists visited his town from America, and the only Americans they see are in John Wayne or Clint Eastwood cowboy films ... and we didn't look like John Wayne or Clint Eastwood. Sal and I began to laugh. Sal is a 5'2" Sicilian, and at that point in his young life, had Afro-type curly hair and spoke Italian without an American accent. I was a little over 5'8" with black curly hair and a mustache. With both of us wearing Italian clothing, we definitely didn't look like their images of American men.

I told the men that I was Italian-American, the grandson of Italians who went to America around the turn of the 20th century. I was then told that I wasn't considered Italian, I was classified as an American who descended from Italians. Sal was told that, as far as they were concerned, he was a Sicilian who just moved away.

Several of the townspeople stopped at the table to say hello and introduce themselves. With all that was going on, two hours passed, after which Albert arrived in a red Ferrari.

I apologized about our time of arrival explaining, once again, that I miscalculated the distance from Reggio to where we were. Albert didn't seem to be bothered by the way the day had progressed and told me softly in English that he would explain later.

After we left the café, we headed to Albert's family home to meet his mom, aunts, uncles, and cousins. After the introduction formalities, we sat at the dinner table and feasted on a tvpical Italian Sunday dinner which lasted for a couple of hours. As I savored each bite, it reminded me of Nanna and Babbononno's Sunday dinner table when I was a kid, good food — no, great food — and lots of family around me. Toward the end of dinner, Albert said that he had booked us into a resort on the ocean in Catanzaro. I was surprised, as I thought we were going to stay with his family in Andali. His comment aroused my curiosity, as he said, "We're celebrating, and the stay at the resort is on me."

It seems that while we were waiting at the café for Albert, he was in negotiations with a German development group who wanted to build a resort on a piece of beachfront property that he owned. They met his price and we were now celebrating. Albert's comment was, "They lost the war, but they're winning the peace."

We checked in and changed into nighttime clothing, and then headed for the resort's disco. I was fascinated at the difference in music and dancing styles compared to back home, but discovered that I was too tired to dance and just watched.

The next morning, we sat outside on the beach to have breakfast. One of Albert's cousins had joined us and we had to speak Italian, as that was his only language. At the next table were two very lovely English girls who were making comments to each other about Sal, Albert, his cousin, and me. Sal and I were singled out as I heard one of the girls say, "I like that short one with the fuzzy hair, he's cute." The other commented, 'What about the one with the mustache and the muscles, he's all right."

Overhearing them, I made the assumption that they didn't know we (well, three of us) could speak English. I thought I would be a wise guy. I said to my companions that I was going to attempt to smoke a cigarette, but discovered that I didn't have any matches. I told them that they should search their pockets, and not find any.

The two English girls had observed the goings-on which was all in Italian, and I then turned toward their table and one of them said, "Si signore?" after which I said with a British accent, "I say, do either of you two ladies have anything in the way of a match?"

They both turned purple in embarrassment and any type of a relationship that could have been possible never happened, but we had ourselves a good laugh, anyway. We stayed at the resort for a couple of days, but Albert had to get back to his business with the Germans. Sal and I headed back to Andeli to say goodbye to Albert's family and the mayor. Afterward, we headed west on the mountain highway that would take us back to Reggio and a super highway north. En route, I experienced one of the scariest happenings in my entire life. But, that's a story for next week. GOD BLESS AMERICA

bench in his Trump University lawsuit. But saying he should recluse himself because he's "Mexican" is about as dumbest thing he has said to date.

Labor-force participation was 65.7 percent in May 2009. Last month, it was 62.6 percent. The percentage of Americans 16 and over who have a job, or are looking for work, is at a 10year low. Student loan debt has soared nearly 70 percent to \$1.2 trillion over Obama's two terms. And by the way, total student loan debt is now greater than the country's credit card debt.

President Obama is the first U.S. president not to produce an annual Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of 3 percent or better. In 2009, it was 2.8 percent. Last year it dropped to 2.4 percent. As far as shadow unemployment, which includes underemployed adults and discouraged unemployed adults who have stopped looking for work, in January 2009 it was 20 percent. January of this year, increased to 23 percent.

The same thing will happen in many other jobs, as machines replace people. You get a higher minimum wage, but fewer jobs. Call this a senseless reform.





It would be interesting to know who may have visited Jack when he lived there. One frequent





HOOPS and HOCKEY in the HUB

On the first full day of summer the NHL announced the complete regular season schedules for all 30 teams, reminding all of us once again that there really isn't an off-season, there are just days when games are not played.

While the Bruins will open the season on October 13th at Columbus, they won't have their home opener until a week later — on October 20th against the New Jersey Devils.

Saturday, October 22nd, has arch rival Montreal Canadiens at the Garden for the first time in about a year. Montreal played at the Garden last fall, but their second game in Massachusetts was the Winter Classic on New Year's Day at Gillette Stadium in Foxboro. The remaining games of the series were in Montreal.

For the last two seasons, the Bruins have missed the playoffs by a whisker on the final day. This year the odds may be more in their favor since eight of the last ten regular season games are at the Garden.

Fans will have to wait some time to see the Stanley Cup Champion Pittsburgh Penguins on Causeway Street. They won't be playing the Bruins at the Garden until January 26th. There are two other games in Pittsburgh — on December 14th and January 22nd.

San Jose, the team that lost to the Pens in the Stanley Cup Final, comes to the Garden on February 9th.

The Bruins' final game of the regular season will be at the Garden against Washington on April 8th. By that time we'll know whether the B's are destined for the playoffs or another extended period when games are not played.

BOWNESS STAYS WITH TAMPA — Former Bruins Head Coach Rick Bowness has signed a two-year contract extension to remain an associate head coach of the Tampa Bay Lightning.

Bowness, who fully admits to wanting a Stanley Cup in the worst way, is now 61. He got his coaching start as an assistant with the Winnipeg Jets in the mid-1980s. He later served as the head coach of the AHL's Maine Mariners (then the Bruins' top minor league affiliate). He was promoted to the head job in Boston for the start of the 1991-1992 season.

The extension came on the heels of Bowness being interviewed for the head coaching position at Anaheim. That job went to Randy Carlisle.

Bowness, who has been a member of the Tampa staff since the 2013-2014 season, sees the Lightning as "very close" to winning a Cup. Indeed, Tampa lost in the Stanley Cup Final in 2015 and was eliminated in Game 7 of the Eastern Conference finals this year.

It was a loss in the Wales Conference Finals to Pittsburgh way back in 1992 that cost Bowness his job with the B's. He was immediately hired as the head coach of the expansion Ottawa Senators. After a stint there he moved on to coaching positions with the New York Islanders, the Phoenix Coyotes, and the Vancouver Canucks.

When the Bruins won the

2011 Stanley Cup in Vancouver, one of the Canucks' assistants taking it all in was former B's Head Coach Rick Bowness.

Bowness told *Tampabay.com* that he has not given any thoughts to retiring. "The day I wake up and don't want to go to the rink, that's the day I retire. I'm a long way from that." He has now served as a head coach or assistant coach in the NHL for more than 2,000 games.

FLYING IN SPRINGFIELD — Springfield, the home of the Basketball Hall of Fame, has a new American Hockey League franchise — the Thunderbirds.

Up until a few weeks ago they were the Portland Pirates, but then the Springfield Falcons moved to Arizona to be near the parent Phoenix Coyotes.

The AHL's headquarters are in Springfield and so, just like that, the Maine franchise upped and moved to Springfield — where the team became the Thunderbirds. The Florida Panthers will remain the NHL parent team.

Everyone's all smiles out there some 90 miles west of the Hub, but there are big challenges ahead. Maine had the second worst average home attendance mark in the league this past season. Which franchise had the worst average home attendance in the 30-team AHL? The Springfield Falcons.

So, the biggest hurdle is having people in that area support the team. For the past several seasons the Falcons lost money. An interesting question is just how the Thunderbirds will reverse that trend.

Some are pinning at least partial hopes on a casino that is scheduled to open in downtown Springfield in 2018. While that may draw some people to Springfield, that doesn't mean they'll come for hockey.

A central motivator in the casino world is to keep people in the building. When people leave and go somewhere else — to eat, drink or have different experiences other than gambling — that is money that the casino has lost. So don't expect casino management to be thrilled if some people leave to watch hockey.

News articles out of Springfield have enthusiastically pointed out that investors have underwritten the team and that sales of season tickets have been impressive.

But a problem with the Falcons was actual attendance — people who went through the turnstiles. That was less than 3,000 a game, far fewer than what was needed on an average

And finally, even though we grew up only nine miles from downtown Springfield, we don't like the fact that a team was essentially poached from another New England city.

There's no happiness in seeing Portland without a team, its franchise simply pulled out from under it like a rug, leaving the city to cope with a now-vacant arena. Over time, Portland may get an East Coast Hockey League franchise. But that's down the road. For now, it's dark days for hockey fans in Maine.
