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

Trump Makes Good Sense Here

President Trump's Administration introduced new measures last week to deny asylum to migrants who enter the country illegally. The measure is expected to face swift legal challenge. Trump seeks to bar migrants seeking asylum after entering U.S. soil from places other than legal ports of entry.


North Washington Street Bridge

Replacement Sidewalk on Western Side of Bridge will be closed beginning November 14th

The Massachusetts Department of Transportation announced that as of Wednesday, November 14, 2018, the western sidewalk (Charles River side) on the North Washington Street Bridge will be closed to all pedestrians. Those seeking to use a sidewalk to travel across the bridge will be detoured to the eastern sidewalk (Boston Harbor side).

Immediately following the closure, crews will secure the area with temporary concrete barrier, fencing, and signage will be placed to help guide pedestrians to the open sidewalk.

The closure will begin immediately to the north (towards Charlestown) of the stairs leading to Lovejoy Wharf. The stairs and elevator to the wharf, as well as the doorway to 160 North

Washington Street including the Converse Store will remain open. The Harbor Walk below the North Washington Street Bridge, which will be rebuilt as part of this project, will also remain open at this time.

Closure and demolition of the western sidewalk is a project requirement to begin installation of temporary supports for the 115-kilovolt electrical line which crosses the Bridge.

Demolition of the North Washington Street Bridge's western fender system will also begin following November 14th. Bridge users can expect to see barge mounted cranes and other equipment stationed in the water on the bridge's western side.

Construction is currently expected to be ompleted in 2023, and the full scope of work includes replacing the existing structurally deficient bridge, providing multi-modal amenities including widened sidewalks, separated bicycle lanes, and bus rapid transit lanes, increasing intersection safety and capability, and improving the navigation channel.



Stirpe Nostra

La TARANTELLA



Tarantola is the correct Italian name for the hairy spider, which we call "tarantula." La Tarantella is a dance of southern Italy, which derives its name from Taranto, in the old province of Apulia. The origin of the dance goes back to the 15th century when a disease known as "tarantism" prevailed in Italy almost in epidemic proportions. It was curable only by means of the continued exercise gained by dancing the tarantella and the music was generally played at a continually increas-

ing speed. It was said that the bite of the Lycosa tarantula, the largest of the European spiders, caused the disease and also a hysteria similar to the St. Vitus dance epidemic in Germany during earlier years. Later experiments showed that the real cause of the infection could not have been from this spider as its bite is no more poisonous than the sting of a wasp. The cause of the disease, therefore, was unknown, but the sickness itself was very real. The illness took the form of madness,

causing some victims to crave water so violently that they had to be restrained from throwing themselves into the sea. Other victims were affected by different colors, which caused strange and outrageous body contortions.

During the 16th century when the epidemic was at its height, bands of musicians toured the country to play music, which was believed to be the only healing medicine. The victims, known as "tarantists," were made to dance to different airs, depending upon the particular form of the disease. They were forced to dance until they often dropped with exhaustion. The epidemic raged only in the summer months and for some particular reason, those who had been attacked by the disease were always liable to get it again.

Another interesting point is that most of the songs, both words and music, which were used to cure tarantism no longer exist ... so stay away from Taranto in the summertime.

For the General Good

Times have changed And we've often rewound the clock *Since the Puritans got a shock* When they landed on Plymouth Rock *If today*

Any shock they should try to stem "Stead of landing on Plymouth Rock Plymouth Rock would land on them"

— "Anything Goes," Cole Porter, 1934

Pilgrims, Plymouth Rock, Poultry, and Pumpkin Pie will all be on the menu next week as we Americans of every origin re-enact and re-interpret the story of that first Thanksgiving in 1621. Somehow, in the story of those Englishmen and women of a strict Calvinist religion, we find meaning to suit the needs of a multi-ethnic and multireligious nation.

Originally headed for the northern part of the Virginia Colony — roughly in the area where New York City is now located — they ended up landing off-course, up here in what would become New England. Being out of the bounds of any established colony, where a colonial charter formed the basis for civil society, the Mayflower passengers found themselves, technically, outside of the law. Their response? They would remain loval subjects of the king, but they would create their own local laws. Pilgrims, who made the passage for religious reasons, and others who crossed the Atlantic for commercial gain, agreed to live together in the New World under equal laws created democratically "for the general good."

The Mayflower Compact was signed on November 11, 1620 (Julian Calendar, the 21st in our Gregorian Calendar) on board the ship Mauflower which was at anchor in Provincetown Harbor. In it they agreed to: "solemnly and mutually in the Presence of God and one of another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil Body Politick, for our better Ordering and Preservation, and Furtherance of the Ends aforesaid; And by Virtue hereof to enact, constitute, and frame, such just and equal Laws, Ordinances, Acts, Constitutions and Offices, from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the General good of the Colony; unto which we promise all due submission and obedience." And, thus, was established the first experiment in limited self-government in North America.

Much has changed since 1621. The American of 2018 is one that the Pilgrims could never have imagined. Yet, their faith, their perseverance, and their early experiment in democracy, still continue to inspire Americans.

May God bless all the readers of the Post-Gazette with his bounty. May he bring all traveling over the weekend safely to their destinations. May he open our hearts to be attentive to the needs of those less fortunate.

Cautions Customers to be Aware of Unofficial Registry Websites

The Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles (RMV) is cautioning customers to make sure that they are using the official MassDOT RMV website Mass. gov/RMV when they are trying to renew a license or registration, schedule a road test, or process any transaction online. Customers may inadvertently come across unofficial thirdparty websites or "mimic sites" that advertise similar services but have no affiliation with the

Customers can use the helpful hints listed below to determine whether the website they are using is the official site for the Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles.

- Massachusetts uses the abbreviation "RMV." Any website using the phrase "Department of Motor Vehicles" or "DMV" should be avoided.
- Make sure the Commonwealth's seal is located somewhere on the page. This will help ensure that it is an official government website. If it cannot be found, customers should leave the site immediately.

Giving Thanks for Food and Family

As November curls its golden glow around us, my mind wanders to images of Thanksgiving, as vivid and fragrant as a perfectly seasoned stuffing. I think of pale sunlight painting patterns on the floor, shining through the last orange leaves which stubbornly cling to otherwise bare branches. Memories of relatives bustling through a crowded kitchen carrying plates of steaming food fill me with the warmth of a hug, especially when I smile as I remember the peals of laughter ringing throughout the house. The buzz of cheering crowds emanates from the sound of the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade on television, occasionally interrupted by commercials featuring jingle bells and Santa's robust ho-ho-ho. Most of all, however, I can taste the explosion of flavors in my mouth from our delectable Thanksgiving dishes: creamy sweet potato, tart cranberries, a velvety pumpkin cheesecake. Thanksgiving remains one of my favorite holidays because it celebrates the very essence of togetherness, reveling in the pleasures of the home and hearth. My family's Thanksgiving combines Italian and American customs, resulting in a feast that honors the universality of love and family.

Food has always been an invaluable staple of Italian culture, and as such my family views Thanksgiving as the epitome of the primordial desire to share a meal. Every item on the menu is prepared with an abundant amount of thought and care — yes, even my vegetarian Tofurkey, replete with its own gravy and wild rice stuffing. I always eagerly await my mother's sweet potato casserole, warm with autumnal spices and topped with with the community, but also to a crunchy streusel of brown maintain an irrevocable connecsugar and pecans. I contribute tion to the traditions of the past.

salad made with crisp apples, blue cheese and cranberries, as well as a pumpkin cheesecake with a seasonally-appropriate gingersnap crust. My father-inlaw provides a pecan pie with a silky chocolate bottom, while my grandmother would make heaping bowls of spaghetti homemade on a hand-cranked utensil known as a chitarra. No matter the food on the table, however, whether Italian or American, what proves most important is that we honor the bountiful harvest of the Earth. Thanksgiving occurs at the point of the year after the gathering of the harvest and withering away of vegetation; as such, it beckons us to enjoy the cozy warmth of family and friends, forming a barrier against the encroaching dark, cold winter. This symbolic connotation compels me to believe that Thanksgiving should never be celebrated alone but rather with others in a celebratory atmosphere, sharing in communal feasting and unending love of family. The more the merrier on this most ritual of holidays!

Indeed, communal food-based festivals similar to Thanksgiving dot the Italian calendar during the autumn and winter. The most famous of these, St. Martin's Day, occurred this past week on November 11th, when Italian villages gathered for banquets featuring chestnuts, goose, and the year's new wine. Now that the Christmas season quickly approaches, Italians are busy in the kitchens or markets preparing delectable meals for the holiday gatherings and various saints' days that pepper the months of November and December. These ritualistic celebrations and meal tap into the powerful desire not only to share strength and sustenance my fresh New England-style According to Italian-American

author Helen Barolini in her book *Festa*, the most significant part of sharing food is the ritual behind it, the repeated customs and motifs that link it to larger, universal themes. Whenever I gather for a Thanksgiving feast, I sense a special kinship with my Italian ancestors of yore, who also congregated around a family table on cool, blustery days to pay homage to the last bounty the Earth bestowed on them before settling for its long winter nap. A tradition does not have to be intricate and fancy to remind us of our subconscious desires for love, gratitude and hope. For example, my husband and I sometimes go out for sushi the day after Thanksgiving, a way of eating a light meal to counterbalance the excesses of the day before and to eschew the rampant commercialism of Black Friday. Honoring our traditions, no matter how small, simultaneously joins us to our past while imbuing our present

with renewed meaning. There are many ways we can commemorate the importance of feasting and tradition this Thanksgiving — ways that last beyond the date of the holiday on November 22nd. We should donate food to local charities and food banks, giving families in need the chance to partake in this festival of gratitude, togetherness, and love. We should relish the time we spend in the company of family and friends, ensuring that we fill the air with laughter and constantly remind each other of our mutual love. And finally, we should all share food together, reveling in that highly symbolic act of community and familiarity, an act which formed the backbone of our ancestors' lives and drives us forward with hope for the

Saint Louis Gabriel Taurin Dufresse

Louis was born at Villede-Lezoux, diocese of Clermont, France in 1750. He was ordained a priest on September 17, 1774. Louis was sent as a missionary to Szechuan, China in 1775.

The renewed persecution of Chinese Christians in 1784 led to Father Dufresse's arrest. He soon escaped from prison and was taken in by a Chinese Catholic family. He subsequently surrendered himself to the Chinese authorities after an auxiliary bishop instructed all the priests staying with families to turn themselves in rather than expose their hosts to the danger of arrest. Father Dufresse was imprisoned and then exiled to Macao. He returned to the missions in 1788. In 1789, he managed to return to Szechwan Province. In the years that followed, his missionary labors were blessed with increasing success

He was appointed as the Titular bishop of Thabraca and Co-adjutor Vicar Apostolic of Se-Ciuen (Setchoan), China on July 24, 1798. He became the Vicar Apostolic on November 15, 1801. He spent the next 15 years in constant danger



during the persecution of Christians, often having to change his place of residence almost daily. He was betrayed to the authorities by a native Christian and was arrested on May 18, 1815. He was beheaded on September 14, 1815 at Chengdu, Sichuan, China. His head was attached to a pole and his body left exposed 43-days as a warning to others. This body was later buried by local Christians.

Pope Leo XIII declared him as venerable on July 2, 1899 and Beatified him on May 27, 1900. He was Canonized by Pope John Paul II on October 1, 2000. The Feast of Saint Louis Gabriel Taurin Dufresse is September 14th.

Botticelli: Heroines and Heroes

Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum

February 14, 2019 – May 19, 2019

For the forthcoming *Botticelli*: Heroines and Heroes exhibition in early 2019, the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum will be the sole venue in the United States to reunite Renaissance master Sandro Botticelli's The Story of Lucretia from the Gardner Museum collection with the painter's Story of Virginia, on loan from Italy for the first time. This presentation explores Botticelli's revolutionary narrative paintings and brings them into dialogue with contemporary responses.

Painted around 1,500, eight monumental works — including important loans from museums in Europe and the U.S. - demonstrate Botticelli's extraordinary talent as a master storyteller. He reinvented ancient Roman and early Christian heroines and heroes as role models, transforming their stories of lust, betrayal, and violence into parables for a new era of political and religious turmoil.

Considered one of the most renowned artists of the Renaissance, Botticelli (about 1445-1510) was sought after by popes, princes, and prelates for paintings to decorate Italian churches. His Medici-era madonnas elevated Botticelli to a household name in Gilded Age Boston. Yet the painter achieved iconic status through his secular paintings — like the Primavera for the Renaissance home. All of the works in the Gardner's exhibition originally filled the palaces of Florence, adorning patrician bedrooms with sophisticated modern spins on ancient tales.

Botticelli: Heroines and Heroes is the first-ever exhibition dedicated to Botticelli's spalliera, a new genre of domestic painting. Deriving from the Italian word indicated the height at which Renaissance viewers experienced these captivating images. As the leading painter of Florence, Botticelli looked to the city's legendary past for heroines and heroes whose lives he reimagined to deliver political, patriotic and moralizing messages into the residences of the Florentine elite.

Unprecedented loans for this exhibition include The Story of Virginia from the Accademia Carrara, Bergamo, never before seen in the United States. Thanks to the exceptional generosity of the National Gallery, London and the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, the Gardner exhibition also reunites three of four panels from another spalliera depicting the story of the early Christian saint Zenobius, celebrated in Florence as the city's first native bishop. Botticelli's unique, unfinished

his working methods while two large scale drawings of the same composition from the Fitzwilliam Museum, Cambridge illuminate how he reworked figure groups for multiple compositions of diverse functions.

Botticelli, like a modern graphic novelist, envisioned episodic stories with multiple scenes featuring the same protagonist. In that spirit, the Gardner Museum commissioned New Yorker magazine cartoonist Karl Stevens to respond to Botticelli's seminal works for this exhibition. Just as Botticelli offered a modern vision of ancient stories, Stevens created up-to-date interpretations of the painter's Renaissance masterworks. His dramatic pen and ink drawings provide frank commentary on these complex tales for the #MeToo moment, interrogating the legacy of Botticelli's stories and honoring Isabella Stewart Gardner's commitment to contemporary art.

In 1894, Isabella Stewart Gardner acquired The Story of major Renaissance painting in her collection. With never-beforeexhibited photographs, books, and letters from the Gardner Museum archives, a special section of the exhibition explores this landmark episode in the history of American collecting and traces the painting's fortunes from Renaissance Florence to the Gilded Age Boston.

Nanna & Babbononno

A Nostalgic Remembrance



Publisher, Dick DeVito, recently sent me an article called, "Capeesh." I will repeat some of it for you, but after I read it, it started me thinking about the local neighborhoods that it was pointing to. I read it to a few friends and to some, it sounded funny. To my Italian friends, it sounded demeaning and stereotypical. Let's see what you think:

"Come stai? Molto bene Bongiorno Ciao Arrivederci." Every Italian knows these expressions and we Italian Americans have used them from time to time. But, the article has a hidden language that the writer called the Goomba Italiano. It's not gangster slang that we hear in today's films that try to depict our ethnic group as the originators, organizers and sole directors of organized crime. The article uses a contraction of Italian, English, and made-up street corner words and calls it "Guido" talk. It starts by saying that when an Italian arrives or leaves from a location he says, "Ciao." When he expresses emotion, he says "Mama Mia," regardless of the situation. The emotional or derogatory sentence might end with "Capeesh?"

Our star of this debacle might use a muppeen to wipe his hands in the cuchina, or get agita from gravy that was too spicy and will skeeve the meatballs he's been served unless they were made by his mother or grandmother. To continue, when he sticks a piece of bread in the gravy, if he gets his fingers wet, he might be considered a "strunzo," "googootz" or a "mezzo finookio." Some of the guys from that old neighborhood are called "Mamalukes," and when referring to the girls, they might have been referred to as "faccia bruta," or "schifosa."

The next set of references include, "cattivo," "cabbadosto," "sfatcheem," "stupido" or "strunzo." These meant you were a pain in the rear or worse. It said that we all carried a corna or horn, which would give the evil eye. Actually, according to superstition, the horn was to ward off the evil eye given by the "malokya," or evil eye expressed by pointing your index and pinkie fingers at a person you wish to curse. From there, it went on to say that when this guy was responding to his parents, grandparents or elders from the neighborhood, he always said, "Per piacere, prego or mille grazie."

If he was feeling tired or out of sorts he used words to describe the sensation such as mooshadda, stunada or mezzomorto. His grandmother would always get him out of this funk by giving him something to eat, maybe a sangweech of cabacol, or some proshoot or mozzarella and a couple of hot peppers. If she was pushing sweets, they might include zeppolis, cannolis, torrone, struffoli, shfooyadell or cookies with pignoli on top. Once out on the street, our friend might use terms like "disgraziato," " mi dispiachay" or just "fa-ghedda boudit." ARE YOU GETTING DISGUSTED

The story then goes on to describe a typical Italian house with a \$40,000 kitchen on the first floor and a 50-year old black iron stove in the cellar, which is constantly used. The living room is filled with old wedding favors and little packets of coated almonds that are too pretty to eat. All lamp shades, stuffed chairs and couches are covered in clear plastic. Portraits of Frank Sinatra and the Pope hang in the dining room. And, God forbid anyone ever attempted to eat Chef Boyardee or Franco American pastas or use any sauce called Ragu or Prego or anything else in cans or jars labeled as Italian. Meat balls are made with pork, veal and beef all mixed together. On Thanksgiving, the turkey might as well be made of plastic due to the fact that no one eats it. A turkey doesn't come up to the level of shcarole soup, ravioli, sausages, meatballs, stuffed artichokes, and stuffed mushrooms all followed by a salad covered with olive oil and red wine vinegar. The wine is always home-made and all the table utensils were placed on the right side of the plate and the napkin on the left. Cloth napkins were at the place settings of the grandparents as they wouldn't use paper napkins. After dinner, the kids would go out and play, the men would head for the living room and all fall asleep and the ladies would clean the dining room and wash the dishes.

When social events would take place especially for the young girls in the family, Aunt Carmela the seamstress would make a formal dress for the cost of the material and the kid's hair would be done by cousin Maria the hairdresser. If the girl had a date for this special occasion, standing in the back of the location would be her parents, grand-parents and her God parents.

By the time I reached this point, I had had enough of the stereotyping. I will admit that some of the comments hit home and I loved them, but

much of it was nothing more than an attempt at comedy demeaning to Italians and Italian Americans. I remember conversations with Dean Saluti when we were young men working on doctoral degrees at Boston University. Some of the descriptions in the forgoing paragraphs were in our conversations as well as the attitudes toward our ethnic origins and their descendants in America. We decided that we, somehow, were going to make a difference in society and help dispel these depictions of who and what we were and are.

Hollywood hasn't helped, but I can't blame them. The producers in the movie industry are out to make money and much of the general public only knows us by what Hollywood portrays in the films they have created. When Dean and I concluded our conversation(s), we decided to begin making that difference for ourselves and our people.

The gods of success must have been smiling at us because we both, as well as an inner circle of friends, have been working at improving the image of Italian Americans. Not because of us, but due to education, whatever levels they may be or whatever disciplines they might involve, things are a lot different than in the days of our parents or the Nannas and Babbononnos of America.

Someone recently asked me why people like Dean and I have been so successful. My whimsical comment was, "We dress British, think Yiddish, but let them know that we are first and foremost, Italian. By the way, growing up in East Boston and the North End, I had never heard the term, "Badda Bing."

My grandparents were the first in the family to try to counter the prejudice, discrimination and stereotyping that followed us into the second and even the third generation. They did it with a work ethic, a close knit family and a love of country (America) among other things. Looking back at the past, at the present and into the future, I think we have succeeded. What do you think???



Boxing's Lessons

Punching from the Shadows
Memoir of a Minor League Professional Boxer



Glen Sharp had a professional boxing career that consisted of three fights of which he lost two. In Punching From The Shadows: Memoir Of A Minor League Professional Boxer he chronicles his time in the ring and the gyms, along with his experiences with the many different and unusual characters that populated the world of boxing in the 1980s He also discusses why a young man decides to take up such a brutal sport, and the effect it had on his life, both short and long term.

Sharp has written a fast paced book that gives the reader much insight into what it takes to become a fighter. Unlike other sports from that era, when a young man would first enter a boxing gym it was very likely he would be training alongside seasoned professionals. This was true for the author, who would become friends with and a sparring partner for five time world title challenger Yaqui Lopez. I don't think many young football players get a chance to workout with Tom Brady, but boxing was a very egalitarian sport. It was one of the things that made it so attractive.

Glen Sharp wasn't some poor kid from the mean streets who sought out boxing as a means to escape a life of poverty. In fact, he explains how the belief that boxing is a poor man's sport is overhyped. Dipping into the writings of Jose Ortega y Gasset as well as Homer, he describes boxing as a form of expression, an artistic pursuit. With the advances man has made, many skills that were once required for survival are no longer needed on a daily basis. However, there is still an urge in many a young man to test himself to see if he can pass the test when challenged on his ability to implement those qualities. These include strength, skill, courage, and endurance. Sharp found the best way for doing that was in taking up boxing.

In Punching Through The Shadows, Glen Sharp gives us an honest telling of his life in boxing. His self doubts and second guessing will be familiar to anyone who has taken a shot at practicing the sweet science. Along the way we meet people such as former Middleweight Champion Carl Bobo Olsen who trained Sharp for a period of time. Reading about the relationship between the former champ and the young prospect only strengthened my belief that having been a top ranked fighter does not necessarily mean you will be good at teaching the art of boxing. In fact, I came away from this book believing Glen Sharp gained more insight into what goes into making a boxer on his own than most trainers do. He really understands the "theory of boxing".



In an interesting chapter entitled Boxing Is Economics Theory Expressed In The Flesh, Sharp, who has an undergraduate degree in economics, puts that knowledge to use in explaining things like the cost/benefit calculation when throwing a punch. When a boxer throws a punch he is most vulnerable to being hit with one. How to mitigate that risk is something

every fighter thinks of, though maybe not in economic theory terms. It makes for interesting reading.

When I say Sharp understands the "theory of boxing", this is made very clear when he describes the styles of some of the leading boxers of the time. His analysis of Joe Frazier as not a slugger but as a skillfully aggressive boxer is both insightful and right on the mark. He also makes a great point when he writes "What a fighter fears most is not physical discomfort ... but rather a failure to live up to the image the fighter has of himself." There are a number of such gems in this book.

Along with many insights into the world of boxing, Sharp also delivers a compelling personal story. His comparison of box-

ing with art serves him well when discussing his own journey. His story is honest and open. He freely discusses his fears, his self doubts, and his disappointment in not being able to become a top boxer. Boxing is a sport of dreams that are rarely fulfilled. Glen Sharp, like just about any kid who ever put on a pair of boxing gloves, dreamed of one day becoming a world champion. As far a long shot as that is in reality, it is still painful to have to accept the fact that it just isn't going to happen. In boxing, the default mode emotionally is to look upon one's self as a failure in so many ways; most of all in believing it means you have failed the test of manhood.

It took Sharp some time to work his way through those feelings. After his third pro fight he stepped back from boxing. A while later he decided he wanted to give it another try. He still felt he could do it and the need to prove himself still burned inside of him. After speaking to a trainer and promoter about making a come-

back, he was advised not to. It was a tough message to get and it hurt. He again uses the comparison with the arts to describe his feelings and how he dealt with this emotionally. It turns out he proved himself solidly.

When visiting a boxing gym today, the odds are you will see something more akin to a huge aerobics class setting than the boxing gyms from a few years back. Boxing gyms are now a platform for group exercise rather than places to learn the expressive art Sharp so well describes. He was around for the waning days of the old school boxing gyms and trainers who understood what it was all about. Punching Through The Shadows is a terrific chronicle of what boxing was and should be. It is also a great story of a young man's quest to test himself and to

quest to test himself and to deal with the emotional turmoil that is so much a passage into manhood.

If you spent time in a boxing gym before they became group fitness centers you will find much of what Sharp has written will bring back memories. If you missed out on those days, you will learn much about what it meant to train in an authentic boxing gym at a time when it was very different than today.

I can't think of another boxing book out there that gives such an inside look at what it was like to pursue the dream of boxing in the way Glen Sharp did. It is a great read on so many levels. Most of all, it is a very human story. I doubt there are many who will not be able to relate to some portions of Sharp's book. I know I did.

HOOPS and HOCKEY in the HUB

The Bruins left town for a road trip with all due speed, buoyed by good play and stand up goaltending as they round the bend toward the first benchmark of the season.

That is Thanksgiving Weekend.

A number of folks in the NHL—among them club president Cam Neely, coach Bruce Cassidy as well as former coach Claude Julien, all subscribe to the notion that where the teams are in the standings on Thanksgiving gives one a pretty good picture concerning how things will look when the teams conclude the regular season in early April.

It's not a perfect measure of course but it is how a good number of eyes that peer across the NHL on a daily envision how the teams might, just might, wind up when the final whistle blows to conclude the regular season schedule about four and a half months down the road.

And you can be sure that if the people who call the shots for the Bruins think that the Turkey Day positioning is important then the players know that as well

Before we arrive at that crossroads, however, there is a bit of a challenge for the B's in the form of a four-game road trip. How the Black and Gold perform away from the Garden in the lead up to Thanksgiving obviously will play a large part in where they stand when they return to Causeway Street to face Pittsburgh in a night game on November 23rd — the Friday of Thanksgiving weekend.

We emphasize that it is a night game because normally there is a doubleheader on Black Friday with the Bruins going first in the afternoon followed by the Celtics furnishing the nightcap. But this year the Celtics have a matchup with Atlanta in Georgia on Friday, thus leaving prime time for the Bruins at 7:30 p.m.

But before the Bruins left for the road, for the most part they took care of things at home, winning three of four games in the Hub to earn a very credible six points on the week.

"I thought we had a good weekend," said a satisfied Bruce Cassidy as he opened his postgame press conference following the team's 4-1 victory over the Vegas Golden Knights.

His comment reflected on the Black and Gold's two victories in a somewhat unusual home stand that featured back-to-back games against Toronto (a 5-1 win) and Vegas.

The successful two-game sweep enabled the club to put the only bump in the week (an 8-5 loss to Vancouver in the rear view mirror) and build upon a 2-1 overtime triumph over Dallas that opened the home stand.

As the Bruins headed for the highway they were playing well and had two players that were hot — right wing David Pastrnak and goalie Jaroslav Halak.

Number 88 departed for the western trip as the National Hockey League's top goal scorer with 16 markers to his credit in just 17 games. In addition, he was tied for fourth in points with 23 amassed thus far — and more to come any day. He was also the sixth player to score 16 or more tallies in 17 games in franchise history — and the first since Peter McNab — who scored 17 in his first 17 outings to start the 1976-1977 campaign.

The club leader in this regard is Espo — Phil Esposito — who found the range 19 times through 17 contests in the opening weeks of the 1973-1974 campaign. That's pretty nifty company for Pastrnak, who seems to have an uncanny knack of weaving around and through NHL defensemen with relative ease.

Halak, of course, was brought on as a backup to Rask over the summer after Anton Khudobin left for Dallas. Right from the get-go there was talk that he might be more than just a backup (we heard that speculation as early as August while attending a Bruins press conference) and that is what he has turned out to be.

The veteran netminder is pushing Rask and has the potential, if he keeps up his white-hot status, to supplant Rask as the top person patrolling the crease.

He allowed only two goals in that pair of weekend victories when Rask was away attending to a personal family matter. Thus, when the weekend drew to a conclusion Halak had some sterling numbers on the season – a 6-1 record to go with a 1.77 goals against average coupled with a .945 save percentage. That was good enough for second place in the entire 31team NHL in both goals against and save percentage with only Pekka Rinne of the Western Conference leading Nashville Predators ahead of him. In addition, the B's as a team were right behind the Preds in fewest goals allowed with 41 compared to Nashville's 37.

By contrast, Rask had a 4-4 record with a 3.05 goals against average and a .905 save percentage as the road trip began.

So Halak is the goalie of the moment, probably somewhat longer and perhaps quite a bit longer. However, Cassidy indicated that Rask, who rejoined the team before it left for the road trip, would start at least one contest on the fourgame swing.

Right now Halak and Pastrnak are the darlings of the Bruins—the youngster and the veteran. During his lengthy NHL career Halak played for the Montreal Canadiens, St. Louis Blues, Washington Capitals and New York Islanders before signing on as a free agent with the B's this past summer.

The thinking at the time was that Halak was a solid netminder who just didn't have a good defensive corps in front of him. The B's management reasoned that a change of venue would make all the difference. That's proven to be correct thus far. But the bulk of the season remains so we'll see what happens. Only time will tell.
