Baker-Polito Administration Releases Detailed Guidelines for the Phased Re-opening of Child Care, Camps, and Summer Recreational Programs

The Baker-Polito Administration released health and safety requirements that apply to the re-opening of all child care programs, recreational camps and municipal or recreational programs not traditionally licensed as camps as part of the phased re-opening of the Commonwealth.

The Department of Early Education and Care (EEC) assembled a Health and Safety Working Group and solicited input from thousands of child care providers from across the Commonwealth, as well as consulted with medical experts at Boston Children's Hospital, to develop the Massachusetts Child and Youth Serving Programs Re-open Approach: Minimum Requirements for Health and Safety. These requirements must be implemented to protect the health and safety of all children, families and staff

and minimize the spread of COVID-19.

Child care programs licensed by EEC will be required to submit plans to the department to be approved once Phase II re-opening begins. The Department will provide templates for submission as the process is launched and will utilize an attestation approval process. In order to mitigate the impact of business interruptions caused by fluctuations in family demand and changes in group sizes outlined in the health and safety guidelines, EEC will provide grants to programs that currently receive CCDBG subsidies through the first two months of re-opening. More details on the re-opening process and child care provider grant program will be released shortly.

Recreational camps and municipal or recreational youth

programs not traditionally licensed as camps may open during Phase II. Residential camps and other overnight stays will not be allowed until Phase III.

Some highlights of the Minimum Requirements for Health and Safety include:

Preparedness Planning: Prior to re-opening, all programs must develop plans for daily health screenings and ways to identify children and staff who are sick, symptomatic, or who become exposed to coronavirus. Programs must also have a plan in place to handle possible closings, staff absences, and gaps in child attendance, as well as determine how to communicate with staff, parents, local boards of health and others.

• Programs must screen all staff and children with a temperature check, before they are permitted to enter the child care space. Programs must establish one entry point to ensure no one is allowed in the building until they pass a health screening.

• Parents must wear masks or face coverings when picking up and dropping off their child on a staggered schedule and will be met at the door by staff.

Face Coverings: Children over the age of 2 should be encouraged to wear a face covering, at the discretion of parents or guardians, if they can safely wear, remove, and handle masks. Certain exceptions are detailed in the guidance. Masks do not need to be worn while playing outdoors if children are able to keep 6 feet apart.

• Children should not wear masks while eating, drinking, sleeping, or napping.

Staff members are encouraged to wear masks or cloth face coverings at all times when caring for children and interacting with parents and families. If possible, the department recommends staff wear transparent masks to enable children to see facial expressions, which is important for child development.

Programs are asked to make additional changes to their operations, including canceling field trips and not holding activities involving attendance of multiple groups. Non-essential visitors, including parents and volunteers, will be restricted from entering the premises of child care programs.

Group sizes and staffing: Group sizes must be restricted to a maximum of 10 children, with a total of 12 individuals including children and staff in each room. Consistent with pre-Covid operations, the infant-to-staff ratio is smaller, with 7

Mourning Day America

This year's Memorial Day holiday seemed more special than ever, as we remembered our fallen heroes who fought and died to keep this nation of ours safe from harm by our enemies foreign and domestic.

This year we are fighting a new invisible enemy. Once again, heroes among us are fighting for us and our nation, are dying on the frontlines in our hospitals, long care health facilities, and on our streets.

I recently stopped by Mt. Wollaston Cemetery near the Quincy Vietnam Veterans Memorial honoring those from Quincy who made the ultimate sacrifice in that long war. I remember enlisting right out of high school back in 1966. I was one of the lucky ones who stayed stateside while in the U.S. Air Force, but I still recall the death toll from that war and the treatment given those returning home from battle.

During the chaos of that war, nearly 2,500 American soldiers were unaccounted for. About half of those were presumed to have been killed in the line of duty, while the other half were listed as MIA or POWs.

When the Paris Peace Accords of 1973 were signed, 591 POWs were released to return home, but the fate of countless others remains unknown to this very day. Their sacrifice will never be forgotten.



Stirpe Nostra

APOLLO

During these past weeks, we discussed the origin of mythology, the Primeval Beings, the Titans, and then the Primary gods. Today's column highlights Apollo, god of sunlight, and brother to the moon goddess Diana.

After her union with Zeus, the beautiful Leto wandered over the lands until the "might one" fastened a floating island with unbreakable chains so that she might have a safe place to give birth. This blessed event produced Apollo and Artemis (Diana).

Apollo appears to have been most enthusiastically worshipped throughout the Greek world, and was one of the most versatile of the gods. Most of us know that he was worshipped as the god of light, but additionally, in this capacity, he was also the enemy of darkness.

He was considered to be the god who brought prosperity to the crops, protected them against disease, and also against insects. As a god of the shepherds, pastures, and the blocks, he also guarded defenseless animals against their predators. This god was looked upon as a promoter of the health, well-being, and purity of mankind. As an idol of manly youth he furnished the power of endurance in boxing, was worshipped as a guide and guardian on land and at sea. He cured sickness, was considered to be a healer and preserver of life, while at the same time, he was also capable of sending deadly plagues down upon mankind. He was the patron of all prophecy, while at Delphi he became the prophet who made Zeus' well known to all men. In time, Apollo also became the god of song and

Apollo became known to the Romans through Tarquinius Superbus, the last king of Regal Rome, who was the first of the Roman kings to consult the Delphic oracle. Tarquinius was also the king who purchased the Sibylline Books (early records of prophetic utterances). It was through these writings that the worship of Apollo was introduced to the Romans, and this worship, in turn, brought about the construction of a temple, dedicated in 431 B.C. to this god of healing.

In ancient artistic representations, this god appears as a beardless, longhaired, muscular, and handsome youth. There was hardly an artist in antiquity who didn't take his turn in portraying some incident described in the countless legends of Apollo. The most

famous statue of him that is preserved today is probably the Apollo Belvedere, which is ascribed to Eocares. It was found at Antium (Anzio) near Rome in the early sixteenth century, and is one of the first examples of ancient sculpture to be placed in the Vatican. It personifies youthful manliness to perfection in an extraordinary elegant attitude, and is considered to be one of the world's most nearly perfect representations of the human figure. The statue was found in a damaged condition, but the arms have since been restored. It appears that Apollo held a bow or argis in his left hand, and from his stance, the experts believe he was fighting with those who threatened to storm his sanctuary

infants to 2 staff members and a maximum of group size of 9.

- Children must remain with the same group each day and at all times while in care. Siblings should be kept in the same group, when suitable.
- Groups must not be combined at any time.
- The same staff must remain with the same group of children each day. Staff should not float between groups either during the day or from day-to-day, with some limited exceptions.


Group transportation should only be provided during the phased re-opening when there is no other option to transport children to and from the program. Programs intending to provide transportation services should follow detailed guidance.

For summer day camps: Campers and counselors will need daily health screenings, including temperature and other checks for signs and symptoms of illness. Camps will need plans in place for when a staff member

or child becomes sick.

- Camp spaces will need to be prepared to ensure physical distancing.
- Camps will need to have at least two health services staff on site at all times.
- Other protocols require campers and counselors to stay together in their groups and staff will not be able to move between groups either during the day or from day-to-day, unless needed to provide supervision of specialized activities such as swimming.
- · Snacks and meals should be brought from home, prepackaged, or ready-to-serve in individual portions to minimize handling and preparation. When this is not feasible, staff must prepare and serve meals. No family-style food service.
- Parents must wear face coverings and camps must develop safe pickup/drop off procedures to maintain social distancing.
- · Camps may not take campers on field trips or for other offsite travel.

Vincent A. Cristiani



Vincent A. Cristiani, Ed.D., age 88, of Quincy, died peacefully, Wednesday, May 27, 2020, at the Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston.

Dr. Cristiani was born in Boston, to the late Michael and Angelina (Catino) Cristiani. Raised and educated in Boston, he was a graduate of Boston Technical High School, Class of 1949, and Boston Teachers College, Class of 1953. He procured his Doctorate at Boston University in 1960. He had lived in Quincy for over sixty years.

Dr. Cristiani served in the U.S. Army during the Korean conflict.

Dr. Cristiani began his distinguished career in education as a teacher in the Boston Public Schools. He served as a visiting Professor at the University of New Hampshire, as the Director of the Registrar's Office for Graduate and Undergraduate students at Boston University's School of Education, as Professor of Psychology and Educational Psychology at Boston State College, and as Professor of Counseling Psychology at the University of Massachusetts at Boston (UMB) where he founded the School Psychology Program in 1982.

Under Dr. Cristiani's leadership, the UMB School Psychology Program was one of the first in the nation to attain approval by the National Association of School Psychologists. At UMB, he served as the Graduate Program Director of the School Psychology Program, Associate Director/Dean of the Institute for Learning and Teaching (ILT) and College of Education, and as the ILT Administrative Coordinator of the Undergraduate and Graduate ILT Programs of Elementary Education, Secondary Education, Counselor Training, Special Education, Educational Administration, School Psychology, and Instructional Design.

Dr. Cristiani was the first recipient of the Lifetime Achievement Award by the Massachusetts School Psychology Association. In 1996, Dr. Cristiani was bestowed the honor of Professor Emeritus. Throughout Dr. Cristiani's career, he always worked directly with students and the community.

His devotion to the Secular Franciscan Order (Prefect), the St. John of God Hospital Fraternity, Franciscan Children's and Rehabilitation Hospital (Kennedy Memorial Hospital), the Knights of Columbus where he served as Grand Knight, Deputy Grand Knight, and was a member of the Fourth Degree, the Quincy Interfaith and Sheltering Coalition, the Dante Alighieri Society, and the Disabled American Veterans, underscored Dr. Cristiani's faith and life of service.

Dr. Cristiani's legacy lives on through his wife, children, grandchildren, and his many students.

Beloved husband for fifty-seven years of Jean T. (DiStasio) Cristiani. Devoted father of Angela Cristiani, Dr. Vincent A. Cristiani, Jr., and John Cristiani, Quincy Fire Department and his wife Tracy, all of Quincy. Loving grandfather of Vincent III, Sophia, Lana, Amanda, and Johnny.

L'Anno Bello: A Year in Italian Folklore

Making the Best of Months

Note: L'Anno Bello is reprinting articles that were written before the Coronavirus pandemic. Obviously, advice on gatherings and reunions contained within are not applicable to this current time when social distancing is the best practice. Please read these articles as a testament to the joy and love that imbues Italian celebrations — and as suggestions for ways to spend time in the future once this pandemic is finally over.



At the beginning of the month, I have a special ritual. I open to the new page on my desk calendar and look through the days of the month, decorating holidays or anniversaries with quirky doodles. Each new month is like an unwrapped gift, quivering with anticipation and a sense of mystery. Indeed, I have always been fascinated by months and, more importantly, their essence. In my mind, every month of the year has a unique character, an underlying trait that sets its days apart from those of other months. Holidays, saints' days, superstitions, family occurrences — all of these events add up to a rich and particular tapestry that typifies any month. During the olden days, when society was primarily based on agriculture, people viewed months as separate entities, depending on the weather and cycles of the sun and moon to help them plant. This is a much more romantic view than the way we perceive months in the modern era, when calendars are synonymous with busy schedules and frozen fruits allow us to eat out of season. I believe that we should reclaim the aura of uniqueness that surrounds each month, enjoying them for their own properties and emotions. For a model on how to do this, we must turn to Italy.

The magic of each month is deeply ingrained in Italian folklore. No matter the season, one can be sure that any given month abounds with its own proverbs and superstitions. Take our current summery peasants of yore bequeathed a number of weather-related proverbs that looked ahead to the harvest of late summer,

or simply commented on the climate that characterized the month. One saying declares: "Giugno ventoso, porta presto il grano sull'aia," meaning that a windy June will soon bring the grain to the farmyard. Another proverb, which reads "In giugno, in bene o in male, c'é sempre un temporale," warns that in June, no matter how good or bad the weather has been, there will always be a rainstorm! Other proverbs relate to the feast days of the saints, which dot the Italian calendar and provide people with a focus for religious devotion and a reckoning system for determining important dates in the agricultural year. Italians may repeat the rhyme "Per San Barnabá, il piú lungo della 'sta." This roughly translates that the feast day of St. Barnabas, or June 11th, is the longest day of the summer, referring to the fact that this date actually coincided with the summer solstice in the years before the Gregorian calendar reform. A charming yet slightly foreboding dictum declares: "La notte di San Giovanni, ogni erba nasconde inganni." This means that on June $23^{\rm rd}$, the eve of St. John the Baptist's feast day, every herb hides some form of deceit — a callback to the old tradition of gathering herbs on this night, when it was believed that the magic of the summer solstice imbued them with mystical healing properties. Finally, other proverbs simply relish the bounty of nature available in June, such as "Giugno ciliege a pugno," which means that cherries are plentiful in June. What month of June. each. January means deep drifts of snow and sparkling ice under an ever-lightening sky. February brings an explosion of red hearts and lace, and eerie masks for Carnivale. March is the month of green, of brisk winds and shamrocks. April recalls daffodils peeking out from the ground and baskets laden with pastel eggs. May translates to an abundance of flowers and the first hints of summer heat from a brightly shining sun. June is the end of the school year, a month of outdoor excursions and mysterious evenings eating out under the pale twilight of late evening. July includes fireworks bursting across a starry dark sky, trips to the rolling ocean waves or the energetic city. 

Sunday Dinner at Grandma's

The following Sunday, as usual, we went to Grandma's for dinner. It was always the same, 12 o'clock Mass, followed by a walk across North Square to Grandma's second story flat that looked onto the square and the church. Dinner at Grandma's was a time for the entire family to get together, an all-day affair. It would begin at about 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The adults sat at the dining table, while the children sat at a card table, Grandma set up in the kitchen. The entire family gathered at her table to discuss family activities of the week, as Grandma nodded her approval or disapproval. She shuffled back and forth to the kitchen, always returning with another platter of food, you knew you were expected to sample, even if it meant bursting. Grandma had a pair of salt and pepper shakers, she always placed on the children's table, that for some reason amused us. They were pale blue ceramic, tall, and curved in on the sides, each with a little button on the top, one was white for salt, the other grey for pepper, releasing a quick burst of their contents when pressed. The fact you did not have to shake them to get the contents out, but simply press a button, captivated us as children.

She served a classic Italian Sunday dinner, beginning with an antipasto made up of salami, prosciutto, provolone cheese and black shiny olives. A bottle of homemade red wine, Grandma just brought up from the cellar, sat in a straw basket



on the table. Everyone drank the wine including the children whose wine was diluted with water. This was followed by an enormous serving of macaroni with meatballs, sausages and braciole. At this point, most non-Italians would think the meal was finished, but not so for Italians of Grandma's era. In the oven was a huge capon stuffed with scrambled eggs and ham, ready to make its appearance followed by roasted potatoes, stuffed mushrooms and eggplant parmesan. The dinner had to be spread over several hours, otherwise you were in danger of exploding. Each course was separated by discussions of family matters, gossip and whatever was going on at church. At about 5 o'clock in the afternoon, Grandma appeared with Italian pastries and cookies.

Everyone recounted their activities for the week. Auntie Angie, Auntie Stella, and Mom would usually speak of a movie they had seen together at the Lancaster Theater on Causeway Street, while Uncle Jimmy and Dad spoke of work. Uncle Carmine seldom attended these gatherings, irritating Grandma who felt all her children should come together at least once a

On this Sunday, just after serving the pastries and several minutes after Pietro and the kids left for a Bocce game, Grandma took a seat at the head of the table, sitting ominously quiet. Everyone knew something was up. Finally, Grandma slammed the table while shouting out, "Silenzio" (silence)! Then came the dreaded words, "There is talk about Pietro." Auntie Angie and Auntie Stella seemed unaware of any reason for gossip concerning Pietro, but Mom continued eating her piece of ricotta pie, as if she heard nothing. Mom then looked up and asked for the recipe. "Carmela, do you know what they are saying about Pietro?" Mom, ignoring the question, said "Mama, give me your recipe. My ricotta pie is soggy compared to yours." Grandma, with her eyes fixed on Mom, responded, "Carmela, forget the ricotta pie. Pietro is in your care and people are talking about him. The Little One is foxy and doesn't want to answer me." Whenever Grandma was angry with Mom and felt Mom was putting something over her, she always called her the "Little One." We could never figure if it was because Mom was her youngest or because Mom was the shortest of the sisters, whatever the reason, it was a signal that Mom was on Grandma's frying pan and definitely in trouble with her.

Franklin Park Zoo & Stone Zoo Now Open

Following its temporary closure in mid-March due to the global health pandemic, Zoo New England has officially re-opened with new health and safety measures in place.

"Care is at the heart of everything we do here at Zoo New England, and our team has been spending a lot of time over the past many weeks planning for how to re-open as safely as possible to protect the health and wellbeing of our visitors, staff and animals," said John Linehan, President and CEO of Zoo New England. "Both Franklin Park and Stone Zoo offer expansive outdoor spaces with plenty of room for social distancing while learning about many of the incredible species that call our Zoos home. While all of our animals have continued to receive excellent care during the closure, both our staff and animals have missed our guests, and we are all very excited to open our gates to visitors once again with new protocols in place."

New health and safety measures that have been implemented include online and timed ticketing, guest capacity limits, one-way paths to control guest flow, clearly designated 6-foot distance markers, enhanced cleaning protocols, more hand sanitizer stations throughout the zoos, and COVID-19 training for all staff.

Guests to the Zoo will be required to purchase tickets online for a designated time slot, and there will be no re-entry once admitted into the Zoo. Members are also required to reserve their time slot prior to their visit. Online tickets for the general public are available for purchase at: www.zoonewengland.org.

Guests and staff are required to wear face coverings, and adhere to 6-foot social distancing while on Zoo grounds. Most all of the pathways at Franklin Park Zoo and Stone Zoo are now one way with clear path markers for guests to follow.

For the first phase of opening, guests can enjoy an Outdoor Safari Walk at the Zoos, as indoor buildings remain closed. At Franklin Park Zoo, guests will be able to see the lions and tigers at the Kalahari Kingdom/Tiger Tales exhibit; red kangaroos and emus at the Outback Trail; the prairie dogs and red pandas at the Nature's Neighborhoods Children's Zoo; the zebras, ostrich and warthogs at Serengeti Crossing; the giraffes and Grevy's zebra at the Giraffe Savannah, and much more. At Stone Zoo, guests can see the flamingos and bush dogs at the Caribbean Coast; the black bears, arctic fox and reindeer in Yukon Creek; the snow leopards and markhor goats in the Himalayan Highlands, as well as the new pack of Mexican gray wolf brothers, North American river otters, white-cheeked gibbons and more. In accordance with public guidance, the playgrounds and play structures at both zoos must remain closed during this first phase of reopening.

While these have been challenging and unprecedented times, Zoo New England remains committed to its mission to protect and sustain the natural world for future generations. Our field conservation work on behalf of rare and threatened species in eastern Massachusetts has continued throughout our closure. How to Keep Your House Clean with Indoor Pets

While our pets may be fantastic company, they can also be smelly and dirty and carry parasites such as fleas and germs. Balls of pet hair, urine stains on the carpet, droppings, shavings, or feathers getting into the most unusual places are all problems that many pet owners struggle with regularly. Pet urine is strong, and you may think you have managed to clean it all away, but often, the uric acid lingers. Products that contain enzymes that neutralize the uric acid are often most before applying the solution.

Tip: If you do not have a premade solution, or you want something as natural as possible, a home remedy can work well. Mix one cup of white vinegar, one cup of water and two teaspoons of baking soda and pop it into a clean spray bottle.

If you are worried about accidents you may not have noticed, you could invest in an ultraviolet light that will highlight any offending areas. Of course, making sure that you work hard on toilet training your dog, cat, rabbit, even bird if they have a log of cage-free time, should be a priority when they are first brought home to help minimize the number of accidents. If your dog, cat, or rabbit is prone to spraying or scent marking, it may be worth speaking with your vet about spaying or

A hooded litter box will also help to contain stray litter and odors, as well as offering your pet more privacy. Vinegar can be great for dissolving any hard-to-remove urine build up. High quality, absorbent bedding material can help to minimize offensive odors and may mean that cleaning effective. Always blot up as does not have to be done quite much excess urine as possible as regularly. Psst! don't forget that it is possible to litter train

a rabbit too! Any cage or enclosure must be safe and the right size for your pet. Some designs will contain stray bedding or droppings more effectively than others.

While reptiles and fish are probably some of the cleanest pets to keep, their tanks or vivarium can still become smelly, and if they get too dirty, it can be unsightly and even a health hazard for your pet. The bedding you use in a vivarium will depend on the type of reptile. Coconut fiber is a popular, environmentally friendly option for minimizing any odors. Birds have incredibly sensitive immune systems and can develop illnesses easily without the right care. Good cage hygiene is vitally important in helping to ensure your bird stays healthy as well as helping to minimize smells and excess feathers gathering in the home. Don't forget about the bowls and toys too; these can harbor germs if they are not regularly cleaned.

Picking the right cleaning and air freshening products: Make sure your chosen cleaning products are safe to use around your pet. Always read the labels and do your research. Avoid strong, caustic products like bleach. Some people choose to make their cleaning products; this can be more economical, more environmentally friendly and allows avoiding the use of harsh or problematic ingredients. Just be sure to get approval from your vet before using any DIY natural solutions. Essential oil diffusers are popular for using to freshen up the home, but certain essential oils can be hazardous to use around any animals (cats and birds are just a few animals that are particularly sensitive to them) and it will likely be better to find an alternative solution altogether. If you do suspect that your pet has been poisoned by a toxic substance, you should contact your bet immediately or call the Pet Poison Hotline.



A childhood friend contacted me recently via Facebook to praise my previous column about a local musician and his future aspirations. I always appreciate the comments my writing receives, especially from friends I've not seen in years. My friend Maria also took that opportunity to update me on her daughter's current situation.

While actress Theresa Moriarty humbly eschews her mom's boasts, she laughs at the attention because her mom proved to be the impetus towards her successes acting and modeling. I caught up with Theresa on Memorial Day weekend in her apartment in New York City. Despite the busy goings on the acting and modeling business exacts, she is home daily because of the limits of COVID-19.

Theresa's resume is a plethora of acting and modeling gigs beginning at age six. "My mom brought me to a model search in Utica (her hometown), and I went to the finals in Buffalo. Then we'd go to auditions across Upstate New York," she adds. "It was fun. Six modeling agencies reached out. And I made trips to New York City."

Those treks placed Theresa in TV commercials for *Gap*, *Toys* "R" Us, *Kids* "R" Us, *Pop Tarts*, *Time-Warner*, as well as other brands. Her career evolved towards *Saturday Night Live*, where she did a skit with actors Will Ferrell and Cheri Oteri. And at age nine, she appeared on *Conan O'Brien's Late-Night Show*. At 16, Theresa played a character's friend on the soap opera *One Life to Live*.

After graduating high school, she entered Manhattan College in the Bronx, earning an English Literature degree in 2010. But the acting bug bit after college. "I never thought of an acting career in college," Theresa reveals, "I focused on academics. And college was a growing experience. I needed to learn how to live and move around safely in New York City. I began taking acting seriously after graduating college."

In 2011, the transition to acting began with her one-woman Off-Off Broadway show *Elizabeth Taylor* at the Susan Batson Theater. "I studied with acting teachers Susan Batson and Marishka Philips at their school," Theresa says. The show was scheduled to run 12 weeks, but its popularity gave the play two extensions.

Though acting is her primary emphasis, modeling is essential to Theresa's repertoire. She works with designers to market their clothes. "Modeling pays the bills in between acting jobs. I'm not a Broadway actress. It's strictly film and TV."

Yet after traveling the country for acting jobs, Theresa started doing voiceovers for TV commercials in 2013. Currently, she does voiceover for all *Macy*'s TV commercials, radio, and the store's Internet platforms. She also promotes *Downy*, *Ulta Beauty* women's cosmetics, and 10 commercial brands each year.

As the coronavirus disallows her to be in-studio, she records from home. Her editor and sound engineers work from a studio in uptown New York. A studio is set up in her apartment. She auditions at home, "which makes getting offers easier," she adds.

"We have a great team. Producers e-mail me the script to record remotely while sound engineers record as I talk. Recording from home is tougher because I don't have pictures. I am grateful for the voiceover (career) as my clients trust me. I can work. I'm doing okay. But I miss seeing the community of fellow creators."

Theresa's penchant to hone her acting skills led her to Standup Comedy. She studied at the improvisational theatre and training center Upright Citizens Brigade Theatre in New York. "It's a way to express myself and to get onstage and perform," Theresa says.

Standup teeters towards risk and reward. "You're vulnerable. You need a level of bravery (to Standup). There's no auditions. But the great thing is you grab a mic and there's this energy

between standup and the audience. It makes acting easier," she says. Prior to the coronavirus, Theresa performed 10 shows each month at *Broadway Comedy Club*, *Greenwich Village Comedy*, and *West Side Comedy Club*.

Subsequent to her Off-Off Broadway show, Theresa began acting fulltime. The slapstick film Made in Chinatown will go to theaters soon. Director Robert Samuels shot the film in Philadelphia the summer of 2018. The cast includes Soprano stars Vincent Pastore, Tony Rossi, Tony Garrow, and Raymond J. Barry. Theresa plays the lead actress love interest. Her latest film When We Dance the Music Dies was shot in 2019, but is on hold during the pandemic. Theresa's role is the daughter character and plays opposite Eric Roberts, brother of actress Julia Roberts. The psycho-thriller is directed by Anthony de Lioncourt. Both films trailers' can be viewed on YouTube.

Regardless of her gratitude for the steady work acting for TV, film, and modeling has brought, Theresa's marriage to Martin Higgins on New Year's Eve 2017, she answered, "Is my biggest accomplishment."

I asked Theresa how she views the larger picture of performing her craft and of the world after the pandemic ceases: "I hope we find a 'new' normal. Leave some of the hustle and bustle behind. Focus on quality jobs over quantity and glorifying the word 'busy.' I'd love to see more people supporting their friend's projects, local theater, Independent films, comedy clubs — valuing in-person experiences and live audiences. Technology and Social Media are great, especially in my industry. But it's easy to isolate ourselves and our views, based on what we see online every day. It's through family, friendships, and understanding the human condition that I am able to do my job as an actress and artist. I am constantly learning and growing and I can't wait to feel safe to travel and learn about other countries, communities, and cultures again."

Saint Willibald

A native of Wessex, England, Willibald was born on October 21st, around the year 700. His mother, Saint Wuna of Wessex was reportedly a sister of Saint Boniface. His father, Saint Richard the Pilgrim, was a chieftain of Wessex. He was the brother of Sts. Winebald and Walburga.

At the age of three, Willibald suffered from a violent illness. His parents prayed to God, vowing to commit Willibald to a monastic life if he was spared. Willibald survived and at the age of five entered the Benedictine monastery at Waldheim and was educated by Abbot Egwald at the monastery. After studying in a monastery in Waitham, in Hampshire, he went on a pilgrimage to Rome 722 with his father, who died on the way at Lucca, Italy. Willibald continued on to Rome and then to Jerusalem. Thinking him to be a spy, he was captured by Saracens who eventually released him and he continued on to the holy places and then to Constantinople, where he visited numerous monasteries, and hermitages. Upon his return to Italy, he went to Monte Cassino where he stayed for ten years, serving as sacristan, dean, and porter. While on a visit to Rome, he met Pope St. Gregory III, who sent him to Germany to assist his cousin St. Boniface in his important missionary work.

He was welcomed by St. Boniface, who ordained him on July 22, 741, and assigned him to missionary work at Eichstätt. Possibly the ordination of Willibald was connected with



Boniface's missionary plans regarding the Slavic people.

On October 21,741, Boniface consecrated him bishop at Sülzenbrücke and soon appointed him bishop of Eichstatt, in Franconia, the Site that his brother Winebald. Willibald founded a double monastery at Heidenheim, naming Winebald abbot and his sister Walburga abbess. Willibald served as bishop for some four decades.

Willibald passed away at Eichstätt, Duchy of Bavaria, East Franconia in 787. He was Canonized by Pope Leo VII in 938. The Feast Day of Saint Willibald is celebrated on July 7th.



At this time of the year, I can't think of a better way to use up leftover Italian bread than to make a "Panzanella"! This Tuscan born tomato and bread salad is also known as pansanella, panmòllo or panmolle and is traditionally a mix of stale Italian bread (soaked in water), sweet tomatoes, red onions, basil, and cucumbers, seasoned with extra virgin olive oil, red wine vinegar and salt. This dish is believed by some to have originated as a peasant dish. Others claim it evolved from sailors at sea, who survived on stale bread soaked in sea water along with the few vegetables they had available in their galley. While the true origin remains unsettled, there is one thing that is certain. Panzanella is a dish that represents how the most delicious Italian cuisine is often derived from simply combining what you have on hand, with fresh seasonal ingredients from the land.

At my Nonna's house, we had a huge garden. When in season, all of our meals were centered around whatever was ready first. When there were squash flowers, Nonna made "squash blossom frittata", string beans called for "string beans and potato salad" and when the tomatoes ripened, the options were never-ending. Panzanella was a dish Nonna would make only from freshly picked and ripened "garden tomatoes". She said it was "the only way it tastes right". Nonna also didn't follow the traditional way of soaking the Italian bread in water, instead she cut it into cubes and "dried it out" in the oven. Her recipe for Panzanella is fast, easy and delicious. It can be served as a first course or even enjoyed as a light summertime lunch!

TUSCAN TOMATO and BREAD SALAD Panzanella

- 1 loaf stale Italian bread (preferably "no salt" Tuscan),
- cut into 3-inch cubes ¹/₄ cup olive oil

sized pieces

- 2 cloves garlic, peeled and
- pressed
 4-5 large garden tomatoes (can
 use sweet cherry tomatoes
 cut into halves), cut into bite
- 1 cucumber, peeled and chopped into bite sized pieces
- 1½ large red onions, thinly sliced
- 7-8 fresh basil leaves, chopped oregano
- salt and pepper to taste

Vinaigrette

³/₄ cup good quality extra virgin olive oil (I use Filippo Berio) ¹/₄ cup red wine vinegar

In a large mixing bowl, toss the bread cubes with the pressed garlic and olive oil to coat. Spread the cubed bread evenly onto a baking sheet, sprinkle with salt and bake until light brown, about 10-15 minutes, turning at the halfway mark to cook evenly. Remove from oven and allow to cool completely.

In a large salad bowl, mix tomatoes, onions, cucumbers and basil. Add the bread cubes and combine. Whisk together the olive oil and vinegar to make a simple vinaigrette and pour this (as much or as little as you prefer) over the bread and vegetable mixture. Add oregano, salt and pepper to taste, and toss well to combine, allowing the vinaigrette, tomato juices and spices to meld. Let stand at room temperature for 30 minutes tossing occasionally, then refrigerate about an hour before serving.

Franklin D. Roosevelt and the New Deal



"First of all, let me assert my firm belief that the only thing we have to fear is fear itself."

With that, on March 4, 1933, Franklin D. Roosevelt opened his inaugural address and made an immediate promise to bring America's economy back to prosperity.

By then, Americans were looking for a savior. Some cities had reached an unemployment rate of 90%. Roosevelt's predecessor, Herbert Hoover, had left a bad flavor in the nation's mouth for what many saw as inadequate responses to the financial crisis. Roosevelt seemed to be the hero we needed.

Roosevelt's first step was declaring a four-day bank holiday, then stabilizing banks and closing insolvent ones. Afterwards, the new president urged citizens to put their money back in savings.

Undoubtedly, Roosevelt's biggest accomplishment in his first year as president was to successfully urge Congress to ratify the 21st Amendment and, with that, Prohibition was repealed.

Among other things he signed the Tennessee Valley Authority Act, allowing the construction of dams along the Tennessee River. Finally, Roosevelt passed many laws protecting unions and the rights of workers.

In the spring and summer of 1935, Roosevelt penned both the Works Progress Administration and the National Labor Relations Act. The first created jobs for unemployed people in the public sector. The most enduring of his accomplishments was the Social Security Act, which guaranteed a pension.

Of course, these programs faced opposition and the Supreme Court struck down a few initiatives, deeming them government overreach. Roosevelt and the Supreme Court battled back and forth up until 1941 when the realities of war changed the game.

Happy Birthday HARRY GREB

Many Believe the Pittsburgh Windmill is the Greatest of All-Time

June 6th marks the 126th anniversary of the birth of Harry Greb who held the Middleweight Title from 1923 to 1926, the Golden Age of Boxing. Greb won the title from Johnny Wilson in 1923 and lost it to Tiger Flowers in 1926. Interestingly, Greb was the only middleweight champion to both win and lose the title to southpaws.


Greb is an intriguing figure. While films were taken of a number of his fights, no known copies exist today. Yet, despite never being seen in action by today's boxing historians, he still is ranked very high by most of them and considered the greatest middleweight of all time by a few. One, Springs Toledo, ranks him as the pound for pound greatest fighter of all time.

In a career that ran from 1913 until 1926, Harry Greb had just under 300 fights. In 1919 alone, he fought 45 times winning every match. He didn't care who he fought or how big they were. In fact, he issued challenges to both Jess Willard and Jack Dempsey.

Out of 298 fights, he only lost 17 times, and he was not fighting stiffs. This was a period when boxing had immense talent and Greb was in there with the best. He was the only man to ever defeat Gene Tunney. He also defeated Mickey Walker, Jack Blackburn, Tommy Loughran, Kid Norfolk, Gunboat Smith, Tommy Gibbons, Battling Levinsky, and Maxie Rosenbloom to name just a few.

Legend and lore surround him as well. There is the story of how after Greb and Walker fought in the ring, later the same night they ran into each other on the street and fought it out again.

There is also the story of the time he sparred with

heavyweight champ Jack Dempsey. There are all kinds of stories surrounding that encounter with some saying he gave the champ all he could handle. For a time, there was talk of matching the two in a title fight.



The Holy Grail of Boxing

HOOPS and HOCKEY in the HUB

He was rough, he was tough, and he epitomized the attitude and characteristics of those big, battling Bruins of the 1980s and beyond.

Yes, we are talking here about the one and only Terrence Joseph James O'Reilly, one of the best remembered bruisers to play for the Bruins back in the day. He remains one of the most popular personalities whenever he graces the TD Garden with his presence.

O'Reilly will turn 69 the first weekend in June, he will be blowing out 69 candles on his birthday cake on June 7th. For many of the Bruins faithful, his time on Causeway Street came to define an era and the aura that flowed from it.

Before O'Reilly gained his fame, he grew up with it all around him — in Niagara Falls, Ontario, Canada — famous for its views of the famous waterfall that continues to draw tourists from around the world. It was just a short walk or drive across a bridge into the U.S. and the American town in New York State with the same name — at a time when a passport was not required. People near the border went back and forth with ease, a vivid demonstration of "the longest undefended border in the world" as a popular saying of the era proudly stated. Indeed, it remains a demarcation that stretches some 5,525 miles across 13 states and eight Canadian provinces.

But while border crossings may have been relaxed, it was O'Reilly who would learn how to defend himself and his teammates. Indeed, in his final year of three seasons spent in the Ontario Hockey League, it was the last that provided a true preview — some 151 minutes in the penalty box over the course of just 54 games. And yes, there was scoring to go with that — such as 23 goals and 42 assists for a total of 65 points, a tidy sum that made the 6-1 right wing a rather complete package in the eyes of the Bruins organization.

And thus it was that Terry O'Reilly was selected in the first round (14th overall) by the Bruins in the 1971 NHL Draft.

When O'Reilly arrived in Boston he did something that would be impossible today — he played a full season in the Garden without being named to the Bruins roster. That's because he spent the 1971-1972 season performing for the Boston Braves of the American Hockey League. His point production went down to 9-8-17 but his minutes in the sin bin remained high at 134. It was also the year that the parent Bruins won their final Stanley Cup of the 20th century.

Not that the Braves didn't have a good season, They finished first in the Eastern Conference of the AHL with 41-21-14 mark for 96 points over the course of the 76-game regular season. The Braves then took out Providence 4-1 in games in the first round of the Calder Cup Playoffs but were then swept 4-0 by Nova Scotia in the second.

Come the next season O'Reilly was with the Bruins. He would remain a Bruins lifer, playing all the NHL regular season games and playoff contests of his career in a Black and Gold uniform.

Sometimes, opportunities come along at just the right moment for individuals. Thus it was that in the 1972 NHL Expansion Draft, each NHL team had to leave a portion of its roster unprotected so that the two additional franchises — the New York Islanders and the Atlanta Flames — could fill their respective slots.

And thus it was that Ed Westfall — a veteran right winger — the same position played by O'Reilly — was selected by the Islanders. Ironically, Westfall had a reputation for killing penalties while O'Reilly, well, you know, had a knack for accumulating them.

One will never know if O'Reilly would have advanced to the Bruins in the fall of 1972 if there had not been an expansion draft a few months earlier. Let's just say that the selection of Westfall by the Islanders certainly didn't hurt O'Reilly's chances of joining the roster of the defending Stanley Cup champions.

Over the course of more than a decade he proved to be a stalwart for the Black and Gold, only missing a few games here and there, except for the 1982-1983 campaign when he was limited to 19 contests, primarily due to a knee injury.

Over the course of his career he would don the B's uniform for 891 games and would score 202 goals plus assist on 404 others for a total of 606 points. But the largest number would be 2,095 — as in penalty minutes. In case you are wondering, that's just under 35 complete games sitting in the PB.

Three times during those years, O'Reilly and his teammates would come close to the Cup — but close is not grasping it. The first occasion would come in 1974 when the B's would advance to the Stanley Cup Final and lose the series 4-2 to Philadelphia. The second would arrive in the spring of 1977 when they would be swept in in the Final 4-0 by the archrival Montreal Canadiens. And the third would be the following year when the Canadiens would do it all over again, taking out the Bruins, 4-2. O'Reilly did his part, going 25-42-67 in 108 career playoff games — along with an additional 335 penalty minutes.

Even after he retired as a player O'Reilly would get another shot at hockey's greatest glory. It came as the culmination of the 1987-1988 season when, as the coach of the Bruins, he led them to the Stanley Cup Final — where the B's were swept by the Edmonton Oilers 4-0.

And, of course, O'Reilly is best known for participating in the Bruins charge into the stands in a game against the Rangers at Madison Square Garden on December 23, 1979. He was suspended for eight games. Even younger fans are familiar with the incident since it is usually shown once or twice a year on video at the Garden, normally when O'Reilly is in attendance in a luxury box as part of his legendary status with the franchise.

His number 24 Jersey was retired in a 2002 ceremony at the Garden. Terry O'Reilly — a Bruins Original for the ages.
