Today, we are a national organization of men and women who represent the estimated 26 million Americans of Italian heritage, dedicated to promoting our culture, our traditions, our language, the legacy of our ancestors, and our contributions to the U.S. and the world. The following is a translation from Italian of the inaugural address given by Dr. Vincenzo Sellaro, founder of the Order Sons and Daughters of Italy in America. Lost since 1935, the speech was discovered recently by Professor Frank P. Oliveri of Rochester, New York, who also trans-

lated it. OSDIA is deeply grateful to Professor Oliveri.

Today is the 22nd of June 1905! Today, we are blessed with a magnificent day of sunshine. Today the Almighty has brought us together for a purpose. We are all brothers and sisters, who represent every corner of Italy.

No matter what part of Italy we came from, we are first and fore-most Italians. I happen to be from Sicily; our pharmacist, Ludovico Ferrara is from Piedmont; our attorney, Antonio Marzullo is from

Campania; Giuseppe Carlino, a sculptor, from Lazio; and our barbers, Pietro Viscardi is from Calabria, and Roberto Merlo is from Tuscany.

But we cannot continue to treat each other as sub-nationalities of the Italian peninsula. If we do, we will not only remain weak as a nationality in the larger American society, but we will also find it difficult to achieve our rightful place influence and respect as we help

make this country greater than ever before. This wonderful country can only become the richer and more cultured as a result of our efforts.

Today, we are gathered together for one main purpose — a purpose that I believe someday will become a very important part of American history. We are the newest of the immigrants to this great country and because of the fierce and undeserved prejudice and discrimination that we have had to suffer for nearly two decades; we must begin to work together for our comon good.


We must educate ourselves and insist that our children receive the best education pos-

Stirpe Nostra



THE FIRST TRIUMVIRATE

Caesar became a consul (chief magistrate) in 59 A.D. and shortly thereafter entered into a coalition with Pompey (an army general) and with Crassus (a wealthy real estate dealer). This coalition became known as the First Triumvirate and its ties were further strengthened by the marriage of Caesar's daughter Julia to Pompey. The jealous Pompey soon attempted to check the increasing power of Julius through much political intrigue. He succeeded in obtaining a decree from the Senate that Caesar should disband his army by a certain date or be considered a public enemy. With the strength and speed characteristics of all his earlier military campaigns, Caesar assembled his legions which were still in Cisalpine Gaul, crossed the River Rubicon, and within three months was master of all of Italy.

Caesar then set out for Spain where he soon dispersed the forces of Pompey and then later defeated Pompey's superior army in Greece by his excellent generalship and courage. Pompey fled to Egypt where he was soon murdered by unknown assassins. Caesar arrived in Egypt in time to settle a disturbance known as the Alexandrine War and then placed Cleopatra on the throne.

Later, he proceeded to Pontus (city on the Black Sea) which at that time was called Cappadocia and ruled by forces opposed to Rome. He defeated Pharnaces and this is when he sent his famous dispatch to Rome, "Veni, vidi, vici," I came, I saw, I conquered. Caesar then returned to Rome where his supremacy was no longer disputed.

During the ensuing months, he exercised the full scope of his civil administration. All of his projects were characterized by the highest order of statesmanship. Meanwhile, Crassus the third member of the Triumvirate

became very wealthy through his association with Caesar. He also trained a group of slaves as firefighters. Fires of suspicious origin would often occur in very desirable pieces of property. Crassus usually appeared on the scene very quickly to offer sympathy to the grieving landlord and also to offer a pittance for the purchase of the burning property. If the offer was refused, then the firefighters usually milled around to hamper all fire-fighting efforts. If the offer was accepted, then the fire was quickly extinguished and the property repaired. Older structures standing on valuable land were usually permitted to completely burn down and Crassus would then bring in a team of trained builders who had a good income producing a structure on the site in record time. He was then handsomely rewarded for his sympathy and capital outlay.

It was said that his fame spread faster than his flame. Crassus was captured while leading an army against the Parthians, and because he had such a great love for wealth, they put him to death by pouring molten gold down his throat. This was known as getting your teeth filled the hard way.

Saint Rafael Arnáiz Barón



Rafael Arnáiz Barón was born on April 9, 1911, in Burgos, Spain. He was the first of four sons born to Rafael Arnáiz, an engineer and Mercedes Barón a newspaper columnist.

In his childhood, he went to several

schools that the Jesuits ran and from October 1920 to 1922 was at one such college in Burgos where he was noted for his artistic talents; bouts of fever often interrupted his studies. In his youth, it was clear that he had a range of intellectual, artistic, and spiritual gifts. These qualities were well balanced in him and it produced an open and positive attitude to people and things which were evidenced in his exuberant good humor and respect. In 1923, his parents relocated to Oviedo where he attended the Jesuit college of San Ignacio; he graduated in 1929.

Once he graduated from high school, he sought a deeper commitment to Jesus Christ. As a graduation present, he spent his summer vacation with his uncle Leopoldo and his aunt María who were the Duke and Duchess of Maqueda at their residence near Ávila. At their encouragement he made, his first contact that September



and then became a novice.

After entering the abbey, Rafael developed diabetes. Complications of the disease forced him to return home for rest and recovery, but each time he returned to his beloved abbey.

Ultimately, his health prevented him from becoming a full member of the community and he became an oblate, a layperson living within the monastery enclosure without full religious yows.

Throughout 1937 and early 1938, his condition worsened and Rafael died from complications of diabetes on April 26, 1938. Honored as a patron of those suffering from diabetes, he was canonized in 2009. The Feast Day of Saint Rafael Arnaiz Baron is April 27th.

Pope Saint John Paul II proposed Saint Rafael as a patron saint of the 1989 World Youth Day, held in Santiago de Compostela, declaring that he was a model for adolescents.

New Space for North End Music & Performing Arts Center

Historic Former North Bennet Street School Site Will Serve As A State-of-the-Art Music Education Space for Boston Youth

Mayor Martin J. Walsh recently announced that the City of Boston has granted tentative designation to North End Music & Performing Arts Center (NEMPAC) as developer for 48-50 Tileston Street in the North End, a historic building formerly associated with the North Bennet St. School. The project was selected following an open call for proposals to create a suitable redevelopment plan for the vacant building. NEMPAC was selected based on their strong proposal and significant support from residents in the North End community as a way to acti-

vate the vacant space with music education programming.

"The North End Music & Performing Arts Center has worked closely with the City, community groups, and funding partners to turn this building into a state-of-the-art music education center for Boston's young people to enjoy," said Mayor Walsh. "I want to thank the Center for helping to transform this building into a welcoming space and providing access to the arts in a unique and historic setting."

The North End Music & Performing Arts Center plans to renovate the historic 2,200-square-foot building to meet accessibility requirements, update classrooms into creative instructional spaces, and expand their educational programming including; music, theatre, and public performances that reach thousands in their community.

"We are grateful to Mayor Walsh and the City of Boston for recognizing the value of the arts. The




former historic Pauline Shaw House will enable NEMPAC to enhance its commitment to music, dance, and theater for our local community and beyond," said Dianne Royle, President of NEMPAC Board of Directors.

This partnership aligns directly with Boston Creates, the City's ten-year cultural plan for enhancing arts and culture in the City of Boston, by supporting the availability, accessibility, and sustainability of cultural spaces for local arts organizations.

"With this additional space, Mayor Walsh and the City of



LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

We are writing to say thank you to State Representative Aaron Michlewitz for his advocacy to increase the state match for the Community Preservation Trust Fund in the state budget!

In 2016 75% of Boston voters cast their ballot in support of the Community Preservation Act (CPA), enabling new funds for affordable housing, historic preservation, and parks and open space.

North Enders value the impact of CPA. Langone Park, undergoing a significant renovation, will have climate esiliency features added with CPA funds recommended by Mayor Walsh, preventing flooding in our neighborhood and throughout downtown. A partnership with the Ausonia Council Knights of Columbus #1513, a local CDC, and the City of Boston will create affordable housing for elders in the Knights' underutilized historic building.

CPA was passed by voters with an expectation of state matching funds. Due to an outdated funding mechanism the match dwindled to just 11%. Chairman Michlewitz included a fix in the House's fiscal year 2020 budget that will bring the match up to nearly 30%, and even more if surplus state funds are added in some years.

We would also like to thank Senator Joseph Boncore for his support of both projects as well.

Here's to Representative Michlewitz and Senator Boncore and too many more years of exciting CPA improvements for our North End neighborhood!

L'Anno Bello: A Year in Italian Folklore

Heating Up and Cooling Down

Summer brings many pleasures, which is why so many people consider it their favorite season. It means vacations and refreshing dips in the pool, bright sunshine and warm weather, licks of an ice cream cone and golden twilight hours that last long into the night. However, summer also introduces days of great humidity, when the air feels like a thick and damp blanket enveloping the earth, when you sit in front of any fan you can find in hopes of some relief. I actually like humid days, for they remind me that summer is really and truly here and differentiate the season from all others. Nevertheless, too much stifling weather can really wreak havoc! During periods of high humidity, I like to stay in an air-conditioned space and enjoy ice-cold glasses of water or lemonade, basking in summer relaxation. While I, like many others, take the humidity in stride as part of the season, in olden days the hot days of summer were considered downright dangerous. In Italy and other places across Europe and the world, a host of superstitions have attached themselves to the dog days of summer. These fascinating bits of folklore remind us that days spent under a scorching sun have both vexed and intrigued our ancestors for generations.

I was reminded of the dog days on a morning when every dog in my neighborhood suddenly got the urge to bark and howl simultaneously. Besides the fact that dogs and other animals feel the summer heat as much as humans do (which is why you should take pre-

the year? The term "dog days" derives from the fact that in ancient times, during the summer, the star Sirius rose about the same time as the sun. Since Sirius is the brightest star in the constellation Canis Major, which means "large dog," the Romans represented the star as a canine — something any Harry Potter fan can tell you! For the ancient Egyptians, the rise of Sirius was viewed as a sign of relief, since it heralded the flooding of the Nile River and thus the growth of crops and vegetation. The Romans, however, perceived Sirius as a malicious and dangerous star. They believed that its brightness combined with that of the sun, causing the heat to rise in the summer! Many superstitions have since attached themselves to the dog days, or dies caniculares as the Romans called them. Supposedly, illnesses run rampant and snakes are more likely to bite during the dog days. Thanks to modern science, we know this is not true, but it is easy to see why these days acquired such a nefarious reputation. In modern times, we can turn on the air conditioner or jump in a pool when it is too hot. In ancient times, people had no such luxuries, and indeed spent the summer having under the hot sun. That must not have been a pleasant experience!

The dog days supposedly last from July 3rd to August 11th. When I visited Italy years ago, it was during the height of the dog days, and I received a big culture shock. Here in the United States, I was used to popping inside an air-conditioned store cautions to keep your pet cool or restaurant when walking and comfortable during the outside in the sweltering heat summer), why the canine asso- got to be too much. In Italy, air ciation with the hottest days of conditioning was practically

rare, that whenever a store did have an air conditioner or fan blasting inside, they advertised outside on colorful posters hung from their windows. Perhaps this reluctance to use air conditioning is due to the Italian fear of il colpo d'aria, or "hit of air": the belief that a blast of air to your neck or throat can cause a wide number of maladies. I also found out that many Italians dislike putting ice in their drinks for fear of indigestion. These cautions, by the way, are not unique to Italy, but prevalent in other European countries as well. Though the lack of air conditioning and ice took some getting used to, I eventually found out that Italians have other great ways of cooling off in the summer. Nearly every time I visited a family member, they had a fresh melone, or melon, waiting on their table. Juicy and refreshing cantaloupes, watermelons, and honeydews form a staple of Italian summer eating, the perfect finale to a muggy day. Italians also enjoy strolling outside in the fresh air during the evening, when the heat of the day has lessened. These walks are called passeggiate, and they provide Italians with the opportunity to chat with family and friends while enjoying a gelato and exploring the city or town. This is a wonderful tradition that America should adopt, especially in the summer, when we could all use some relaxation and time in the outdoors!

I believe that the dog days serve as a wake-up call to relax. The humid, stagnant air and high heat is nature's way of telling us that we can use time to recharge and take it easy. Too often, our busy schedules and hectic modern lives keep us from taking time for ourselves, even in the midst of summer. Whether we set apart a few minutes to enjoy a cool glass of lemonade (with ice, of course!) or take a cue from the Italians and spend summer evenings basking in the fresh air and company of family, these small indulgences will rejuvenate our energy and our enjoyment of the season. When it is too humid to go outside — and we should all be mindful of risks like heatstroke and heart problems during especially hot days — relax inside, taking a bite out of a juicy melon and watching your favorite movie. For summer is too beautiful a time of the year to ignore, no matter how muggy the dog days get!

Top Ten Fourth of July Pet Safety Tips

Like many Americans, you may be planning to have a festive Fourth of July. Along with barbeques and a day at the beach, no July holiday celebration would be complete without enjoying the fireworks that celebrate the birth of our nation. Perhaps you are considering staying at home and planning a get-together with friends and family. Or, you may want to go check out your local professional fireworks display. While putting the finishing touches on your planned celebration, take a moment to consider your pets. Unlike, people, pets don't associate the noise, flashes, and burning smell of pyrotechnics with celebration. Pets are terrified of fireworks, and often panic at the loud whizzes and bangs they produce.

- 10. Keep your Pet indoors at all times: It may seem obvious, but even if your pet is used to being outside, the resulting panic caused by fireworks or other loud noises may make them break their restraint or jump a fence in a terrified attempt to find safety.
- 9. Don't put insect repellant on your pet that isn't specifically for pet use: The same tip applies to applying "people" sunscreen on your pet. What isn't toxic to humans can be toxic to animals. The ASPCA lists the poisonous effects of sunscreen on your pet as "drooling, vomiting, diarrhea, excessive thirst and lethargy. DEET a common insecticide, may cause neurological issues.
- 8. Alcoholic Drinks Poison **Pets:** If your pet drinks alcohol, they can become dangerously intoxicated, go into a coma, or in severe cases, die from respiratory failure. Yes, even beer is toxic, Fermented hops and ethanol are poisonous to dogs
- 7. Going to fireworks display? Leave your pet home: The safest place for your pet is at home, not in a crowded, unfamiliar and noisy place. The combination of too many



people and loud fireworks will make your beloved pet freak out and desperately seek shelter. Locking them in the car is also not an option; your pet may suffer brain damage and heat

- 6. Have your pet properly **identified:** If your pet manages to break loose and become lost, without proper identification it will be that much harder to get them back. Consider fitting your pet with microchip identification, ID tags with their name and your phone number, or both. It is also a good idea to have a recent picture of your pets in case you have to put up signs.
- 5. Keep your pet away from glow jewelry: I might look cute, but your pet could chew up and swallow the plastic adornments. The ASPCA states that while not highly toxic, "excessive drooling and gastrointestinal irritation could still result from ingestions and intestinal blockage could occur from swallowing large pieces of the plastic containers."
- 4. Never use Fireworks around pets: While lit fireworks can pose a danger to curious pets and potentially result in severe burns and/or trauma to the face and paws, even unused fireworks can be hazardous. Some fireworks contain potentially toxic substances such as arsenic, potassium nitrate and other heavy metals.
- 3. Don't give your pet "Table Food": If you are having a backyard barbeque, you may be tempted to slip some

snacks to your pet. But like beer and chocolate, there are other festive foods that could harm your pet. Onions, coffee, avocado, grapes & raisins, salt and yeast dough are all possible hazards for dogs and cats.

- 2. Lighter fluid and matches are harmful to pets: The ASPCA list chlorates as a harmful substance found in some matches that, if ingested, can cause your pet difficulty in breathing, damage blood cells or even cause kidney disease. If exposed to lighter fluid, your pet may sustain skin irritation on contact, respiratory problems if inhaled, and gastric problems if ingested.
- 1. Citronella insect control products harm pets, too: Oil, candles, insect coils and other citronella-based repellants are irritating toxins to pets, according to ASPCA. The result of inhalation can cause severe respiratory illnesses such as pneumonia, and ingestion can harm your pet's nervous system.

The safest and best bet for celebrating the Fourth of July with your pets is to exclude them from the holiday festivities, at least this time around. Instead, find a safe, secure spot in the home for your pets while you go out and enjoy the loud bangs, bright lights and spectator fun. Your pets will appreciate the quiet a lot more than you'll enjoy the noise.

Enjoy your holiday, stay safe, don't drink and drive. It's all about "Unconditional Love"

Removing daily makeup and daily grime is imperative to maintaining good skin!





sible. Only through education will we understand the ways and beliefs of this marvelous adopted country of ours, and be treated as equal and worthy American citizens.

We left our native land for a new life, in order to survive. Our former country and its government demonstrated after so many years of trying, that it was simply not capable of providing us what we deserved — a decent and respectable life.

The majority of us have come to these shores as the poorest of all Italians, and the least educated of most of Europe. But we are also the most courageous for having made the decision to come here, we left behind our motherland and our families, in the hope, not to *find* a new life, but to *earn* a better one.

Before leaving Italy, only a few of us were fortunate enough to have received an education. Many of us reached these shores as common laborers, tenant farmers, field workers, shepherds, gardeners, and fishermen. But just as many of us came as skilled artisans — masons, carpenters, stonecutters, bakers, tailors, and miners. And our contribution as tradesmen, lawyers, teachers, accountants, entrepreneurs, pharmacists, and yes, doctors

as well — is second to none.

One of our most important objectives should be to bring over the rest of our family members we left behind in Italy and do that as soon as possible. The other objective that all of us must keep in mind at all times is that at all times whatever we say or do must enhance the greatness of this wonderful country that has received so many of us. We ask only for the opportunity to earn a living! We are not here to be a burden. By staying united and helping one another we will achieve all our goals.

Some say that history has dealt us a bad hand because we are the last to come to America, but I say to them, "Wasn't it one of our own who discovered America?" While others might have come here with masters and, in many cases, as slaves, we have come of our own accord. We are a free people.

It is because of this that today I have a dream and a hope that someday, even if it takes a hundred more years before we are fully accepted, our children and their children's children, even if they carry a single drop of Italian blood will be able and proud to continue to carry on our traditions, our culture, and our language. It is up to us, and what we do today!



Released on March 8, 1994, Superunknown debuted at No. 1 on the Billboard Top 200 Albums chart and sold over 5 million copies in the United States. Featured are genredefying hits as the churning anthem "Black Hole Sun," the foreboding "Fell On Black Days," the eclectic individuality of "Spoonman," the optimistic rush of "The Day I Tried To Live," and the off-kilter crest of "My Wave," among the 16 tracks. Formed in Seattle, Soundgarden went on to create a series of groundbreaking, best-selling rock albums until initially dissolving in 1997, then later reforming for a period of time in the 2010s.

Badmotorfinger is Soundgarden's third studio album, originally released on September 24, 1991, and began the Ben Shepherd era as the band's new bassist. Keeping their heavy metal sound and the presence of the Seattle grunge scene, Soundgarden was charted singles from the album as, "Jesus Christ Pose," "Outshined" and "Rusty Cage," from the dozen tracks. WHY IS CHINATOWN'S POOR AIR QUALITY SO SURPRISING?

According to a recent report, Chinatown has the worse air quality in Massachusetts. The Science Advocacy Group also said Asian-Americans are exposed to 36 percent more harmful pollution particles than white residents. Representatives from the Union of Concerned Scientists, lawmakers and activists met outside the Josiah Quincy Upper School in Boston's Chinatown to highlight the high levels of poor air. According to Ken Kimmel, the Union's president, "In fact, right here where we're standing, our modeling indicates it is ... the most exposed transportation pollution site in the Commonwealth." Why

is this big news? Look where Chinatown is located and what surrounds it. Route 93 and the Mass Pike! How many cars a day drive right by this urban neighborhood? How much garbage goes into the air and how much damage does this do to the human body?

We have the findings but what can be done? Geographically, Chinatown is ground zero for poor air quality and we won't solve this issue riding bikes or driving electric cars. Having a report telling us what is wrong doesn't clean the air. What solutions are out there, how much will they cost, and how far off are we talking about actually doing something about it?

A Nostalgic Remembrance



A TRIBUTE TO MY FATHER

My father was a pioneer in the Department of Audio and Visual Education, created by the Boston Public Schools just after WWII. During the '30s, he had been on the road with a couple of famous big bands, traveling the country playing swing music for the bobby soxers. When the war started, the bands began breaking up as many musicians traded their instruments for rifles, machine guns, and other weapons of war. Dad came home and registered for the draft. While waiting to be called, he accepted a job teaching machine shop at his old alma mater, East Boston High School. He didn't have a college degree at that point, but if a tradesman wanted to teach his or her trade, all they had to do was to prove they had spent seven years in that trade. As a kid, Dad had been employed by an iron works and he was hired by the Boston Public School Department.

Once the war was over, Dad was approached by a friend who was in administration at the school committee headquarters. It seems that a neighbor of his, from Jamaica Plain, was running for a seat on the Boston School Committee and had no contacts in East Boston or the North End. Dad was asked to help out. He met with the prospective candidate and the two men hit it off. As a result, Dad agreed to help out.

It was a bit difficult for Dad as he was playing with a band six nights a week and teaching five days a week, but he succeeded in obtaining enough votes for the candidate, Dan McDevett, to capture East Boston and the North End. Once in, Dan told my father about a new department being considered in the Boston Public Schools. It seems that the superintendent's office wanted every school to have a projector to show films and a repository that lent the films to the schools, hence the new Department of Audio and Visual Education.

Dad headed to Boston State College and took the necessary courses to prepare himself to become one of the four pioneers in this new department. The man who initially asked Dad to help Dan McDevitt out was to become the director of the new division, Joe Hennessey. The other two men were Lester Morris and Mike Barca. (Mike and Dad would become the best of friends, and we would buy a cottage in Maine a few years later to be near Mike and his family who vacationed there each summer.)

As the department grew, they were given tons of war surplus equipment by the federal government. Joe Hennessey would determine if what they were sent could be used at the local schools, and if something couldn't be used, the men of the department could take the equipment home. As a result, our cellar looked like a war surplus store. The only thing I still have is a pair of field binoculars.

Dad brought home a tank radio that wound up in Babbononno's room. My grandfather was becoming progressively deaf and wouldn't admit it. As a result, on Saturdays, when the Metropolitan Opera House in New York would air their weekly show, Babbononno would switch on his tank radio and you could hear Italian grand opera all over the neighborhood. That radio was loud.

Working in the audiovisual department had its perks. The school committee, city council, and the mayor's office would have Dad or one of the other department member's film events that they participated in. This, of course, was back in the day before video tape was invented. Because Dad became so involved in the filming needed by Boston officials, he was often given perks that were usually reserved for politicians and the people they wanted to

From the point in time when I was just out of diapers, I was a Red Sox fan. One of the perks Dad received was a pass to sit with the city hall politicians at Fenway. Back when I was a kid, the first or second row of seats just to the left of the Red Sox dugout were reserved for Boston officials. Dad couldn't use the seat he was assigned to at night as he was usually playing music. He often looked for someone in the neighborhood who might be going to Fenway Park on a particular night and have them take me along and deposit me at the seat location I mentioned, and then pick me up for the return trip home.

Being a sweet young kid, I didn't know who most of the people were that surrounded me. All of them referred to me as "Little John," or "John C's" son. On any given night, especially if the Yankees were in town, I would be sitting with the mayor, the police commissioner, the fire chief and members of the city council and school committee, and a couple of times, the governor. As a result, they bought me hot dogs, soda, ice cream, and peanuts. I was treated like a little king ... I didn't object.

During those early years, Dad traveled to many of the schools showing films that they had requested. Most of them were industrial or educational films, not Hollywood productions. Once each school had an AV person who could operate a movie projector, Dad could back off and just work out of the department's main office.

Later, after a few more courses had been taken, Dad became the person who designed the science experiments used at the junior high schools around the city. They fell under the jurisdiction of the Audio Visual Department, also. Dad would pack the necessary equipment and chemicals for a series of experiments in wooden boxes and have them delivered to each junior high in the city. As the department grew, more people became involved and Dad didn't have to leave the office as much as he did in those pioneering days. At one point in time, he looked around and discovered that he was the last of the four men who started the new department right after

Unfortunately, when bussing started in Boston, the superintendent of schools sent midlevel administrators out to the schools that were in trouble due to racial tensions. Dad would often come home feeling like he had been in combat. He was often nervous and irritable. He and Mom sat down one day and discussed what was going on and Mom asked, "Do you have enough time to retire?" The answer was yes. She then asked if they could live on whatever his pension would be. Again, the answer was yes. And so, Dad put in his papers and retired. He immediately became more involved with the operations of the Boston Musicians Union, something he had been part of for decades. He continued in this direction until ill health put an end to playing at night and heading to the union hall during the day. His birthday would have been this month on the 9th. He would have been 109. He had a great life and always said the words I end my column

Recipes from the Homeland

POTATO SALAD ALL' ITALIANA

4 potatoes

1 large onion (Vidalia preferred in season)

3 tablespoons olive oil

1 tablespoon oregano 3 tablespoons cider vinegar Salt and pepper

Peel skins from potatoes. Cut into one and a half or two-inch portions. Wash potatoes and set aside. Heat enough water in a saucepan to a boil. Add potato portions. Cover saucepan. Boil potato portions until tender (about fifteen to twenty minutes). Do not overcook.

While potatoes are cooking, remove outer skin from onion. Cut onion in half, lengthwise, and then into one-quarter-inch strips.

Strain potatoes from water when fork-tender and place in a bowl. While potato portions are hot, add the onion, olive oil, oregano, cider vinegar, salt and pepper to taste. Mix the contents thoroughly. Cover bowl and place in refrigerator to chill before serving. Additional vinegar may be added for a more vinegary taste.

OPTIONAL: Potatoes may be washed and placed whole in heated water to boil until skin separates slightly (approximately thirty minutes). Place potatoes in a bowl. Remove skin and then cut and follow directions given above. I find additional flavor from potatoes when boiled whole with skin.

Serves four.

NOTE: As a youngster, I helped Mama many times as she prepared large portions of this salad for summer cookouts in Wilmington. This popular potato salad also traveled frequently with us to the numerous family picnics. Aunts, uncles, and cousins gathered in one or two of Papa's trucks and followed us to north or south shore beaches.

This is not only simple to make but can be prepared the previous day. Allowing the potatoes, oil, vinegar and oregano to blend overnight in the refrigerator enhances the flavor of this salad.

Memories of the Fourth

Fourth of July celebration. I couldn't have been more than three. As it has been ever since, it was a family affair. My parents took me, of course, and my aunt was there, I remember as much. Mostly, however, I remember being mesmerized by the fireworks, those big colorful sprinkles seemingly taking over the sky above us.

When you are a child, time seems eternal. I remember thinking of the span of a year as a long epoch, and so it was with my first Fourth celebration, a memory in the remote

But growing up near Castle Island, Fourth of July celebrations were destined to become an integral part of my childhood. There was no better place to celebrate our nation's birthday. During college we often spent the Fourth with family friends in Quincy and we would walk over to Marina Bay where we would watch the show in Boston across the water. This was one of the best views of the fireworks I have seen apart from the celebration at the Common one year.

Years have passed, people have come and gone, and the family has spread. And yet, the Fourth still brings us together. The beauty of the Fourth of July is that, as no two American stories are alike, no two takes on the day are the same.



HOOPS and HOCKEY in the HUB

Once he presided over a hockey empire, reigning for more than a decade across his regal realm that comprised the college version of the game.

Lured to the National Hockey League, he took leave of his castle in the sparsely populated state of North Dakota and proceeded to Philadelphia in the summer of 2015. There it was expected that his magic would work wonders in the City of Brotherly Love. After all, the Flyers had not won the Stanley Cup since 1975.

But such dreams were not to be realized and in December Dave Hakstol was shown the door. Perhaps the most respected college hockey coach in contemporary times, he was out of a job, but not out of opportunities.

Still, from December 17th, the day he was dismissed, all through the rest of the NHL regular season and the two-month postseason, little was heard about the former star coach.

Now comes the news that Hakstol will be returning to the NHL this coming season — as an assistant coach in Toronto under Head Coach Mike Babcock.

"I'm excited to join the Maple Leafs' coaching staff," said Hakstol in a press release. "I am looking forward to building relationships with players and working with the entire group."

It will definitely be an adjustment for the veteran mentor who coached the University of North Dakota Fighting Hawks (formerly the Fighting Sioux) for 11 seasons, leading the team to seven NCAA Division 1 Frozen Four appearances over that span.

For now though, rather than calling all the shots and building his own program, he will no longer be the commander of the ship, but one of the supporting cast.

From covering the NHL, we can tell you what that means. Yes, he will work every day with players and establish bonds with them. However, he will rarely be noticed by the public, will not give press conferences, and thus will hardly ever be mentioned in the media.

In short, he will no longer be the face of a team. And don't forget another important factor — the financial one. Assistants typically make far less than head coaches in the NHL (or in the NBA and NFL for that matter).

We mention that because the situation that Hakstol finds himself in almost totally negates why he chose to jump to the NHL in the first place — money.

Supposedly, he received a \$10 million contract to leave what he had built in North Dakota and come to Philadelphia.

But things didn't work out. There were a couple of early round playoff exits, a 134-101-42 mark overall that somewhat masked a 12-15-4 start to the 2018-2019 campaign.

The handwriting was written on the wall, so to speak, when Flyers' GM Ron Hextall was fired on November 26th.

Plus, when the team lost 11 games in a 14-game span, one knew things were going south. Hakstol's last game behind the bench was a 5-1 loss at Vancouver.

"It was not good enough, obviously, because the end result is what matters," Hakstol told the Associated Press at the time.

When new GM Chuck Fletcher came aboard, Hakstol was let go after only three and a half seasons behind the bench.

You have to give Hextall credit. He went down extoling his coach. "Dave is one of the hardest working people I know," he said. "He's got a lot of respect around the league. You'd be shocked when I talk to my colleagues how much respect he has. He's a good coach."

That may very well be, but in the result oriented world of professional sports that was not enough.

It was another case of someone leaving a place where he had everything — highly successful and one who reigned supreme in North Dakota (a state without a pro franchise) — to a location where he basically had to start over.

Yes, he was paid in the millions, but what is that if the price to acquire that sum is to leave a place where one is revered?

It's a route that Jack Parker refused to take in the 1990s when the legendary Boston University head coach turned the Bruins down twice. He knew that the revolving door that is the reality of coaching in the NHL would eventually sweep him out.

Wisely, he chose to continue a successful, lengthy career at BU, beloved and respected. To be sure, his decision meant he would continue to make far less money that he could have made in the NHL. But by staying on campus, he continued to experience the respect and good will of the Boston University community and beyond — aspects that money could not buy.

Still, if Hakstol had to land somewhere in the NHL next season, the Maple Leafs provide a quality location. Let's face it, to be hired he must be on the same page with Head Coach Mike Babcock, currently serving as the face of the franchise as he experiences the financial blessings of a \$50 million multi-year contract.

The Leafs certainly have potential. Remember that as the first round opponent of the Bruins in this year's Stanley Cup playoffs, they actually had the B's in a pretty desperate situation.

It seems like a long time ago but back in April the Bruins actually trailed the Leafs 3-2 in games, meaning Toronto actually held the upper hand as the series left the Garden after Game 5 and proceeded back to Canada.

But the Bruins won Game 6 on the road by a 4-2 score and then captured Game 7 back at the Garden by a 5-1 count to eliminate the Leafs for the second straight season.

It's hard to believe now but a postseason that didn't end until June 12th, faced the real possibility of concluding back on April 21st (Game 6) or April 23rd (Game 7).

Fans won't have to wait too long to see a rematch. The Bruins play at Toronto on October 19th, and then face each other at the TD Garden on October 22nd. Thoughts to consider as summer marches on.
