Opening ceremony of the four-day event was the procession to Christopher Columbus Park for the Blessing of the Fishing Waters followed by live entertainment.





CALIGULA THE MURDERER



Milonia Caesonia

Caligula had a mistress named Milonia Caesonia and one day she slipped him a love potion. The drug made him dangerously ill and left him derange. He immediately threw off all appearances of virtue and moderation and became as nutty as a fruitcake. The most elaborate tortures became his constant enjoyments. During his mealtimes, he had criminals as well as innocent persons stretched on a rack and then beheaded. Even the most respected citizens were not immune to his daily persecutions.

Some of the highest senators were required to run in their togas for several miles beside his chariot and also attend him as a servant at his dining table. Others

he secretly put to death, but continued to send for them as though they were still alive. After a few days of this deception, he would insist that they had committed suicide.

One senator who really made the "mud" list was the victim of trumped-up sedition charges. The senator was eventually mangled and dragged through the streets. Caligula's cruel heart was not satisfied until the man's limbs, members, and bowels were heaped up before the palace.

A sick magistrate on a medical leave of absence did not recuperate fast enough and was put to death. Even when dining, relaxing, or being amused by any other means, there was the constant examination of prisoners by torture and then the decapitation in

There seemed to be no limit to his envy and jealousy as is reflected in the story of a man named Ptolemy (not the famous Egyptian ruler), who was invited to visit Rome and was received with honor. He wore a splendid purple cloak while attending a gladiatorial show and this attracted more general attention than the presence of the emperor himself. There are a few loose ends to the story, but for this reason and for no other, the man was executed.

The theater was a part of the highest social activity of Roman society. A comedy writer was burned alive in the middle of the arena because he wrote a humorous line that had a double meaning, which reflected some doubt upon the integrity of the emperor.

A gallant Roman knight was thrown to the wild beasts for some minor offense. When he loudly protested his innocence, Caligula removed him from the arena, had his tongue cut off, and then put him back again.

A recalled exile was asked how he spent his time while away from Rome. Attempting flattery, the man replied, "I prayed to the gods that Tiberius might die and that you would become emperor." Caligula, thinking that all of the existing exiles were likewise praying for his death, sent secret agents to the islands to butcher all of them.

Before leaving Rome for one of his numerous journeys, someone wished that he never would return, whereupon the entire group of well-wishers were seized and thrown into the sea to drown.

L'Anno Bello: A Year in Italian Folklore

Almanacs, an Awesome Treasure Trove

If you stepped into my parents' old home on any given day, you would most likely have heard the television tuned in to the Italian language channel. I no longer batted an eye, for I have been used to this since practically the day I was born. Due to my father's love for the Italian channel, practically every day of my life has consisted of some variation of a silly variety show, hour-long quiz game, soccer match, Italian soap opera, or news program. While I used to find these shows rather goofy when I was little, I now appreciate them for helping me learn the Italian language and about Italian culture — I especially love the travel and science programs, and I now subscribe to this channel myself. However, my favorite show on the Italian channel has not aired for years, though one can catch some snippets online. It is called Almanacco di Domani, or Tomorrow's Almanac, and like most good things in my life, it was introduced to me by my dad. This quaint little fifteenminute show provided folkloristic, astronomical, and fun fact information pertaining to the upcoming day — birthdays, history, recipes, notable quotes, you name it! Even saying the name in my mind conjures images of cozy dark evenings spent curled up on my couch at home, listening to the zany music announce the details of the next day.

I just love almanacs because they celebrate seasonal time and tradition, which anyone reading this column knows I wholeheartedly embrace. Italian almanacs, whether in the form of the aforementioned television show or quick write-ups in local newspapers, are especially useful for anyone trying to find out more about the customs, beliefs and values that characterize his or her heritage. In Italian almanacs, you will almost always find the following:

1) The Saint of the Day: The calendar of saints is very important to Italian culture. Until not too long ago, this calendar often determined the name of the child born on a particular day. In this month of August, for example, you could have babies named Lorenzo (St. Lawrence's Day, August 10th), Assunta or Maria (Assumption of the Virgin Mary, August 15th), Elena (St. Helen's Day, August 18th), Bartolomeo (St. Bartholomew's Day, August 24th), or, as is the case in many a family, Rocco (St. Roch's Day, August 16th). If not named after the saint on his or her birthday, an Italian might otherwise receive well wishes on

their onomastico — that is, the feast day of the saint with whom the person shares their moniker. The feast days of saints are also interesting for the holiday and seasonal lore associated with them. The Assumption, for example, acquired many customs related to the start of the grain and first-fruits harvest, which, like the feast day, occurred around mid-August.

2) The Sun and Moon: Like American almanacs, Italian almanacs will also tell the rising and setting times of the sun and the moon. In olden times, farmers would have found this information very useful. Superstition parceled out various agricultural tasks to certain phases of the moon, such as planting crops during the period when the moon grows in the sky to ensure a similar result. Of course, nights with a full moon promised magic and mischief of all kinds. I like checking the rise and set of the sun in order to gauge seasonal changes. When the sun no longer sets after eight o'clock, as is happening now, I know autumn is on its way. Similarly, I love watching the sunset time progressively grow longer after the winter solstice with the anticipation of the coming spring.

I love almanacs because they remind me that every day is special. Each day arrives laden with its own lore, history and curiosities. Almanacs teach us to always look forward, to keep hope and to always count even the smallest pleasures that a day can bestow. Now that the almanac bug has bitten me, I know that I will continue to pore over these olden bundles of wisdom and humor, whether in the form of Almanacco di Domani or The Farmer's Almanac website. So thanks to my dad for introducing me to these cultural curios, and happy (almanac) reading to all!

Earlier this summer while taking a good power walk along Wollaston Beach on Quincy Shore Drive, I came upon Paul "Paulie" Veneto and his brightly colored RV in service of remembrance for the flight crews who lost their lives on 9-11-01. I stopped walking and started talking with him. As we talked, many others came up to him to ask his story and he told them of his mission in life to never forget those who died that day.

Nearly a year ago on Saturday, August 21, 2021, Paulie who comes from Milton and now lives in Braintree, was at the Hilton Boston Logan Airport Hotel helping to commemorate the 20th anniversary by remembering and honoring the flight crews who lost their lives on 9/11 so many years ago now.

When the service ended in a remarkable testimony to his fallen crewmembers, retired United flight attendant Veneto marked the 20th anniversary by pushing an airline beverage cart from Logan Airport to Ground Zero in New York City. The beverage cart was decorated with

photos of flight attendants who died in the attack on America as a reminder of courage and bravery and called their heroics that fateful day. He has continued on always telling anyone who will listen to him that the airline crewmembers were indeed the very first responders that terrifying day. Along his way last year, he pushed his cart 220 miles to share the many stories of the crew and his own.

Veneto was a flight attendant on United Flight 175. He was off that day September 11, 2001 and now has found purpose to tell this story about all his fallen friends and coworkers.

Over all these years Paulie and his beverage cart have crossed many, many miles and he hopes to be able to push that cart again this year and for all the years that are to come for him.

I felt very lucky to have met him and heard his story earlier this summer back in mid-July and now as we quickly approach the end of summer, it means another 9/11 anniversary will be upon us once again.

I am sure these anniversaries bring much sadness to Paulie and all of us for a day we will never forget even if we tried. But for him, it is so personal. His mission it would seem is to keep the memory of that day alive so that we never forget the courage shown that day from flight crews and passengers who were courageous to the very end.

Wouldn't it be nice if we named September 11th as American Heroes Day? One final note, I know it can't be easy for Veneto to keep on fighting year after year. He continues to battle for his fellow crewmembers and all Americans. Paulie continues to talk the talk and walk the walk. His action using his beverage cart is a very powerful statement on his part.

Saint Philomena

Little is known about the life of St. Philomena. However, it is believed she was a Greek princess who became a virgin martyr and died at 13. All that is known about her life comes from a Neapolitan nun's vision. Sister Maria Luisa di Gesú claims St. Philomena came to her and told her she was the daughter of a Greek king who converted to Christianity. When Philomena was 13 years old, she took a vow of consecrated virginity. The nun's account states Philomena was born on January 10th and was killed on August 10th.

After her father took his family to Rome to make peace, Emperor Diocletian fell in love with Philomena. When she refused to marry him, she was tortured. Diocletian had Philomena decapitated. According to the story, her death came on a Friday at three in the afternoon, the same as Jesus.



Two anchors, three arrows, a palm symbol of martyrdom, and a flower were found on the tiles in her tomb, interpreted as symbols of her martyrdom. Devotion for Philomena began to spread once her bones were exhumed and miracles began to occur. Canon Francesco De Lucia of Mugnano del Cardinale received relics of St. Philomena and had them placed in the Church of Our Lady of Grace in Mugnano, Italy.

Soon after her relics were enshrined, cancers were cured and wounds healed. The Venerable Pauline Jaricot was cured of a severe heart issue overnight, all attributed to St. Philomena. Other Saints, who venerated Philomena and attributed miracles in their lives to the young martyr, include St. John Marie Vianney and St. Peter Louis Marie Chanel.

Although controversy sometimes surrounds the truth behind St. Philomena's life and sainthood, many believers all around the world continue to see her as a miraculous saint, canonized in 1837.

St. Philomena is the patron saint of infants, babies, and youths. Her feast day is celebrated on August 11th.



Harvest, Store, and Preserve Herbs from the Garden

Keep enjoying your homegrown herbs all year round. Harvest throughout the growing season and include them in garden-fresh meals. Then preserve a few for the winter ahead.

Snip a few leaves or leaf-covered stems as needed. For the same intensity of flavor, you generally need two to three times more fresh herbs than dried except for Rosemary which has an equally strong flavor fresh or dried. So, if the recipe calls for one teaspoon of dried parsley use one Tablespoon (3 teaspoons) of fresh parsley leaves.

Continue harvesting herbs as needed throughout the growing season. And don't worry about harming the plant because regular harvesting encourages new growth which means more for vou to harvest. Just be sure to leave enough of the leaves intact to maintain plant growth.

You can remove as much as fifty percent of the leaves from established annual herb plants. This is about when the plants near their final height. You can remove up to one third from established perennial plants that have been in the garden for several months or more. Harvest when the plant has formed buds, but before they open into flowers for the greatest concentration of flavor. This is the perfect time to harvest herbs you plan to preserve.

Use a pair of garden scissors or bypass pruners for faster and easier harvesting. Make your cuts above a set of healthy leaves to keep the plants looking good. Then, preserve the flavor and zest of herbs with proper storage and preservation.

Store thin leafy herbs like parsley and cilantro for up to a week in the refrigerator. Place the stems in a jar of water, like a flower arrangement, and loosely cover with a plastic bag. Keep basil out of the fridge to avoid discoloration and others on the counter for quick and frequent use.

Wrap dry thicker-leafed herbs like sage and thyme in a paper towel, set inside a plastic bag and place in a warmer section of the refrigerator.

Freeze sprigs, whole leaves or chopped clean herbs on a cookie sheet. Or pack clean diced herbs in ice cube trays and fill the empty spaces with water. These are great for use in soups and stews. Store the frozen herbs and ice cubes in an airtight container or baggie in the freezer.

Or bundle several stems together, secure with a rubber band and use a spring type clothespin to hang them in a warm, dry place to dry out. Make your own drying rack from an old embroidery hoop, string, and S hooks.

Get creative and use some of your herbs to make a fragrant edible wreath. Use fresh herbs that are flexible and easier to shape into a wreath. They will dry in place and can be harvested as needed.

Speed up the drying process in the microwave. Place herbs on a paper towel-covered paper plate. Start with one to two minutes on high. Repeat for 30 seconds as needed until the herbs are brittle. Store dried herbs in an airtight plastic or glass jar.

Keep enjoying these fresh-from-the-garden flavors throughout the remainder of the season. And consider preserving a few for you, your family, and friends to enjoy throughout the winter.



Finding San Francisco: Part I

At first glance San Francisco appears an odd and somewhat mismatched marriage between east coast structural design and Pacific coast appreciations. It's a peculiar creation, an on descript ambiance that leaves uncertainty in response. It is easy to say that San Francisco is simply a city like no other, which is perfectly true, but that does little to define its essence.

Of course, a lot of this I knew going in and was precisely what drew me to the city. I have visited southern California several times since 2013 and the furthest north I've been is Yosemite Valley. But I've long known San Francisco as the oldest city in a state that in part due to its need to adapt to extreme natural elements and in part due to its history and culture is in a constant move for the modern. San Francisco was modeled very much then like Boston and New York; tall Edwardian era buildings, narrow streets, immigrant quarters and designed around public transportation unlike, say, Los Angeles in which an automobile was already a necessity as early as the late 1920s.

After the Spanish, the Jesuits and the prospectors either left or settled, much of California was built to welcome the migrations west after the Reconstruction era when the industrializing northeast was becoming overcrowded with migrants from the South and new arrivals from Europe. housing with this new found space. By the early 20th century William Mulholland had found a way to bring down water from Owens Valley for the needed irrigation.

Of course, with the easing of travel after WWI California began to attract a different sort of settler. The businessman, urban developers, hotel magnates and, finally, the film industry. And so the cities like Los Angeles and San Diego bloomed from sleepy towns into "new cities" in many ways unlike anything seen or that could even be accommodated in the east.

In time, European immigrants began finding their way to the Pacific Coast from Ellis Island. Anaheim, for instance, became a German stronghold (interestingly, the early German immigrants seemed to be drawn to the southwest with communities taking root in Santa Fe and other cities).

The completion of the Pacific railway in the latter half of the 19th century likely inspired these migrations and it was its construction, in fact, that made California a haven for a new set of immigrants arriving now from China and Japan.

As the diversity of its population and the varied climate across the wide state would imply, the infrastructure of the state became widely varied and distinct from huts to bungalows.

Recent decades have brought immigrants from around the world, students and entrepreneurs from all over the country and the new needs and developments have also influenced the housing from the first ranch houses, modernist architecture and homes with special consideration for wild fires and earthquake proofing.

While much of the rest of California has evolved into its own individual identities (Silicon Valley, Beverly Hills, Oakland, etc.) the look and even atmosphere of San Francisco has remained rooted in the golden age of American building.



That's not to say it stood still. It could not, in fact, after the devastating earthquake of 1906 which, along with the ensuing fires, leveled much of the city. In a rush to bring the city back to prominence as an international port of commerce Mayor Eugene Schmitz made a point of downplaying the scale of the disaster to encourage reinvestment in the city.

San Francisco was quickly rebuilt. In less than a decade there were virtually no signs of a major natural disaster having devastated the area, but the haste with which the city was brought back up from its ashes meant a criminal compromise in the soundness of the infrastructure.

Nonetheless, the city returned to its vibrancy, its industry and even its seediness with its redlight districts.

As the decades passed on San Francisco's reputation changed from a mariner's delight with the saloons of the Barbary Coast during the turn of the 20th century to the mecca of the counter culture sixty years later, a utopia of free love, drugs, music and flower children as encapsulated by Scott McKenzie.

More than any other city in California, San Francisco reflects its long and colorful history with features telling different stories from its varied past. I've heard it compared to Boston and it shares with my city a long episodic and sometimes turbulent history. But just like Boston and New York were shaped by fragments of many stories overtime into unique metropolises so San Francisco became a place like no other. It is a city with a voice, a mind, a story and a heart all its own.

A Nostalgic Remembrance



Two things happened recently. One made me happy, and the other proud, and they both concerned family. First, a couple of weeks ago, son John told me that he was going to be playing at a Thursday night "open mike" concert at the General Store in Harvard, Mass.

An open mike scenario includes people who spend a few minutes in front of an audience entertaining them in some way: playing instruments or/ and singing, doing a comedy routine, reciting poetry, etc. ... Son John, my oldest, plays guitar, as did his great-grandfather, Babbononno. John, unlike most musicians, is unschooled. He just picked up the guitar one day, and played. When he was just starting high school and showed promise on an instrument, I brought him to a musician who taught guitar. I phrase it that way because lots of music teachers are not professional musicians and I was hoping John was going to make it 4 generations in a row, playing professionally.

After the second lesson, the teacher told me that he couldn't teach John how to play guitar. He added, "He hears things in his head and plays them, things that are beyond anything I can teach him; just let him do his own thing." That was about 25 years ago and John plays guitar, very well, I might add, but music that is in his head, not on paper.

Anyway, John told us about the open mike night and Loretta and I headed to the town of Harvard. When we arrived, John was already there, setting up his equipment. About 10 other musicians were doing the same thing. Just then we hear two soprano voices yelling, "Hi Nonna, hi Nonno." My daughterin-law, Beth (John's wife) had brought our grandchildren to the club to hear their father play. Next we became surrounded by several of the young men John had grown up with. They were there to cheer him on and a couple to play with him.

Just then, son Michael and daughter-in-law Kathy snuck up behind us. They had driven in from New York to hear John. It now seemed like an extended family reunion. As all of the younger folks greeted each other, I quietly sat back, sipped a beer and reflected on an earlier day when our house was the catchall for John and Mike's friends and now here they were again ... just a few years older.

Once the entertainment began, it sounded like the Turk's Head Coffee House back in the

1950s with all of the folk music. (I thought I was on Charles Street listening to the Beatnik generation.) John joined in to play back-up with a couple of the guitarists, and they did their own thing. As I said earlier, he plays what's in his head and it often comes out jazz. Babbononno would have been proud. Dad would have been proud, and I definnately was proud. When the night came to an end, Loretta and I left to head home and the younger folks stayed behind to discuss the events of the night. If John ever gets paid for playing music, he would be classified as a professional and it would truly be 4 generations in a row.

The second of the two episodes concerns cousins. I only have 4 first cousins and they are on the Contini side. First, my late Uncle Paul (my mother's oldest brother) had two daughters, Paula and Eleanor. Paula is a few years older than I and Eleanor, or Ellie, is a year younger than I am. The other two cousins, Donna and Richard, are twins and are the children of my late Uncle Gino, my mother's youngest brother. Donna and I speak often, but Paula lives out of state and I don't think I seen her in several years.

Recently, Donna called to tell me that Paula was in town and asked if I would like to get together with her for lunch. A date was set, and when it arrived, Donna and I headed to the Legal Seafood at the North Shore Mall. Within minutes, Paula showed up driven by her son, Mark. We stared at each other for a minute and then smiled recognizing the faces we remembered before old age set in.

Donna is a lot younger than Paula and I and just listened as Paula and I reminisced about our youthful days. When Paula and I were kids, we all lived in Nanna and Babbononno's house at 70 Eutaw Street in East Boston. Nanna, Babbononno, Mom, Dad, Uncle Gino and I all lived on the first floor. Uncle Paul and his family lived on the second floor. At one point during WWII, Uncle Paul moved his family to St. Edwards Road in Orient Heights. Not long afterward, Nanna had a heart attack. After she returned home, it was decided that the house was too big to handle and it was sold. Mom, Dad and I moved 2 doors away to 74 Eutaw Street and stayed there until 1961. Nanna and Babbononno rented an apartment on Princeton Street, a ten minute walk from the old location

Paula talked about her parents, especially her father. Uncle Paul was in the printing business during the day and played music at night. He played sax and clarinet and could play all types of music but Dixieland was his favorite and he excelled at it. As the conversation continued, Paula and I discovered that Uncle Nick (Mom's middle brother) and his first wife, Ada, were our mutual God parents. After they were divorced, Ada lost contact with our family for the most part, and when Uncle Nick married Aunt Dorothy, she was put through the ringer by many in the family. Some wouldn't accept that she was divorced (so was Uncle Nick), not Italian and outspoken.

As the conversation continued, I told Paula that, even though Dorothy retired and bought a condo in Florida, Uncle Nick waited until after Loretta and I were married before he retired and joined his wife in Pompano, and later, Del Ray Beach. I added in that, to Uncle Nick, I was the son he would never have, and when my kids came along, they were his and Aunt Dorothy's surrogate grandchildren.

Paula is now a widow living in Naples, Florida. Her son, Mark lives in Saugus and she is spending the summer with him. But like Loretta and me, as soon as it gets cold around here, Florida is the place to be.

Well, the one hour luncheon became three hours as we sat there talking about our youthful days when Nanna and Babbononno were alive and our parents were young adults and very active. As we were ready to leave, we made plans to gettogether more often, knowing that this would please our parents and grandparents and the distance between us in Florida is only 2 or 3 hours by car. I'm looking forward to getting the family closer together. I think our folks; Nanna and Babbononno would have liked it that way

In America, a "crumb cake" refers to a plain or butter flavored cake having a baked-on crumb topping made from flour, sugars, butter and cinnamon. Though many use the terms interchangeably, a "New York Style Crumb Cake" has a layer of cake topped with an equally thick layer of crumb, while a "Coffee Cake", though similar, and sometimes even made the same, is usually more cake than crumb. In Italy, a crumb cake or tart is called a sbriciolata which some say translates to "crumbled" and others claim it's a derivative of briciola' meaning crumb. The Italian crumbled cakes differ from American crumb cakes in several ways. The sbriciolata appears to be more a crumble than a cake. Neither its bottom layer nor crumb top are a cake. In fact, both are made from the same shortcrust pastry. The sbiciolata also has a middle layer typically made from either fruits, jams, chocolate spreads or even ricotta creams.

I have tried many different sbriciolatas and to me, one has always been more delicious than the next! The crust and crumble are generally always the same, but the fillings can be varied to almost any fruit, jam, or spread that you please. At this time of year, my Nonna often made her sbriciolata alla pesce with ripened peaches she had on hand. Though it was delicious, I also love the apple version (pictured below) and the Blueberry Ricotta just as much. All of these are incredibly easy to create, so the choice is all yours. For a delicious dessert that your friends and family will love, try one of my Nonna's "Italian Crumble Cake". It's perfect to serve on a warm summer day with a delicious Cappuccino Fredo!

ITALI AN CRUMBLE CAKE Torta Sbriciolata



Blueberry Ricotta Filling

1 cup whole milk ricotta ½ cup confectioners' sugar 1 organic lemon, zested 1-pint fresh blueberries In a medium bowl, add ricotta, confectioners' sugar and lemon zest, mix together well. Add blueberries and toss together gently.

Apple Filling 3 large apples, peeled and cut into cubes ½ cup granulated sugar 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour Juice of 1 lemon Pinch of cinnamon In a saucepan, add all the filling ingredients, toss together and cook over medium heat for 5 minutes. Apples will be just slightly softened, set aside to cool.

Peach Filling

4 peaches, sliced 2 ½ tablespoons sugar Place peaches and sugar in a bowl, toss together well, cover and set aside for 30 minutes.

Crumb Dough

2 ½ cups all-purpose flour ½ bustina paneangeli di lievito per dolce (can substitute 11/4 teaspoons baking powder and 1 teaspoons vanilla) 3/4 cup granulated sugar 11 tablespoons butter, cut into small pieces

Finishing

1/4 to 1/2 cup confectioners' suaar

2 large egg yolks, beaten

Preheat the oven to 350°. Grease and flour a 9-inch tart or springform pan, set aside.

In a large bowl, sift the flour, lievito per dolce or baking powder, and sugar together. With your hands, work the butter and then beaten yolks into this mixture, until it is crumbly.

Split the dough in half. Press one half into the bottom of prepared pan, making sure to press some of the dough around the sides up about 1 to 1 ½ inches from the bottom. Spread the fruit (peach or cooled apple) or blueberry ricotta mixture on top of this dough.

Take the remaining half of the dough and crumble/sprinkle evenly over the top of the filling, it should look like crumbs.

Bake for about 35 to 40 minutes, or until the crumbs on top are golden colored, but not brown. Cool completely, remove sides of pan and sift confectioners' sugar over the top before serving. Refrigerate leftovers.






On August 15, 1951 Joe Louis, making a comeback, defeated Jimmy Bivins by a ten round decision in Baltimore.



HOOPS and HOCKEY in the HUB

HOW HIGH CAN THEY GO?

— Well, down in New York City, the Knicks have a plan afoot to add a few "ultra-premium seats" right near midcourt at Madison Square Garden. This would be accomplished by opening up an area near the current scorer's table, thus creating both a front row and a second row of seats.

If you need to ask the price, it most likely means you won't be sitting there if you travel to NYC to see the Celtics play the Knicks — the battle of the last two NBA teams that play in their original franchise cities.

Those tickets will set you back up to \$3,000 per seat, meaning that if you attend with a friend or family member the total would come to a lofty \$6,000.

Another way to think of it is that viewing each quarter of any of the 41 Knicks home games from one of those seats would cost a fan \$750 for each 12 minutes of action. That's a tidy sum that should thin out one's wallet or purse quite well.

It's also a way for Knicks owner James Dolan to add revenue while keeping his word. Dolan has a policy of not raising ticket prices when the Knicks are coming off a season in which they did not qualify for the playoffs — as happened last year.

So, ticket prices on existing seats won't be raised at Madison Square Garden. But that says nothing about seats that are newly created and thus did not exist last season. Thus, first-time ticket prices will be instituted on the new seats.

Of course, one need not travel to see the Celtics take on the Knicks. But they will have to wait. That's because the Green and White will not take on their traditional rivals from NYC at the TD Garden until the calendar flips to 2023 — with home games against the Knicks set for January 26th and March 6th.

By then, we will know a lot more about the 2022-2023 Celtics team as it attempts to return to the NBA Finals once again. There is every reason to believe that the Celtics will be back in the playoffs come April. And yes, we also hope the Knicks make the 2023 playoffs since a potential Celtics-Knicks battle in the postseason would be a phenomenal draw.

A REGULAR SEASON FILLED WITH EXCITEMENT — Yes, that is what the upcoming home portion of the newly announced 2022-2023 schedule holds for Celtics fans who will fill the TD Garden this coming season.

The season opener will come on October 18th when the C's host the Philadelphia 76ers led by former Celtics head coach Doc Rivers. Any game with Doc is an interesting one — especially since he is the last Celtics coach to lead the team to an NBA title.

The regular season will come to end on April 9th when the Celtics play Atlanta at the Garden. In between those two contests, there will be 39 additional home games and 41 matchups on the road.

We always like to focus on games that involve last year's playoff opponents. The headliner for games involving this group will be the home contest involving the C's and Golden State. While the two teams will play in California on December 10th, every Boston fan will have January 19th circled on the calendar. That's when the Warriors will make their only regular season appearance at the Garden.

It will mark the first time that Golden State will play in Boston since June 16th, when the Warriors defeated the Celtics 103-90 in Game Six of the Finals to claim the NBA Championship.

Of course, the Celtics also eliminated three opponents from the playoffs on the way to their matchup in the Finals with Golden State. Thus, when the Green and White take on Brooklyn in Boston on February 1st, it will be the first time the Nets will be in the Hub since the C's swept them out of the playoffs back on April 26th. The Nets will also come to Causeway Street on March 3rd. The Celtics pay a visit to Brooklyn on January 12th.

After the Celtics polished off the Nets, they faced the Milwaukee Bucks, eliminating them in a hard-fought series on May 15th with a 109-81 Game Seven victory. This year, Milwaukee comes to the Garden on Christmas Day, marking the seventh season in a row the Celtics have played on Christmas. The Bucks also play in Boston on March 30th. The Celtics go to Milwaukee for a February 14th matchup.

Back in the second half of May, the Celtics played the Miami Heat in the Eastern Conference Finals. The series went the full seven games with the C's prevailing 100-96 in the decisive contest that was played on May 29th in Miami.

This season the Heat will come to the Garden for a two-game series, meeting the Celtics on the parquet floor on October 30th and November 2nd. The Celtics will travel to the Sunshine State to take on the Heat on January 24th.

In addition to these contests, another big game is the annual appearance of the Los Angeles Lakers at the Garden. Over the course of several decades, it has always been one of the most anticipated home games.

This year will be no different as NBA megastar LeBron James leads the Lakers into the Hub on January 28th in the latest renewal of this historic rivalry.

A familiar player who may not be active this coming season is Rajon Rondo. He was known as the last player from the Celtics 2008 NBA Championship team to still be on an NBA roster. Now 36, he played in 21 games for the Cleveland Cavaliers in the final months of the 2021-2022 season, averaging 6.2 points and 4.9 assists. After being traded by the Celtics in December 2014, he became an NBA journeyman, playing for eight additional franchises.

But time may have run out for the durable guard, a four-time NBA All-Star who also won an NBA Championship with the Lakers in 2020. Still listed as a free agent entering the final days of August, he has only a few weeks to gain a roster spot somewhere in the league for what would be his 17th season.
