

Trump Calls "Left-Wing Indoctrination"

Boston Public Schools Welcomes Students for the 2020-21 School Year

Mayor Walsh and Superintendent Cassellius Provided a Video Message To Students to Welcome Them Back to BPS for the 2020-21 School Year

The Boston Public Schools (BPS) launched the 2020 - 2021 school year with a full day of remote learning for all students. Students began their days in virtual homerooms then participated in a series of live and recorded lessons. Students will remain in remote learning until at least October 1st.

"As we begin the school year, we know our young people need safe, comforting spaces where they can learn and grow more than ever," said Boston Mayor Martin J. Walsh. "We've spent the summer monitoring public health information, strengthening remote learning and ensuring our facilities are ready to welcome students and staff back to our schools. For all students, families, teachers and schools starting the year today, I want you to know you have the full support of your City, and vour Mayor."

BPS prioritized equity, public health, and safety in its reopening plan for the 2020-21 school year. In addition, BPS respected family choice by providing both all-remote and opt-in hybrid learning models. Students in all grades began the school year learning remotely on Sepptember 21st. For families that selected the hybrid learning model, students will return to school buildings in phases, starting no sooner than Thursday, October 1st, beginning with students with the highest needs, who are prioritized for in-person learning.

Families who opted in to the hybrid model have been notified of their Group A or Group B

assignment. In phases, students in Group A will attend schools on Mondays and Tuesdays and students in Group B will attend school on Thursdays and Fridays. All will learn online on Wednesdays to allow for cleaning, disinfecting, and sanitizing of buildings.

The phase-in of the hybrid learning model will follow the schedule below (double dates reference the Group A and Group B starts). Each step will begin no sooner than the listed date and only if public health data shows that it is safe for inperson learning:

- Monday, September 21st: All students began remote learning
- Thursday, October 1st: Students prioritized for inperson learning begin hybrid
- Thursday, October 15th (B) & Monday, October 19th (A): Grades K0, K1, K2 return
- Thursday, October 22nd (B) & Monday, October 26th (A): Grades 1 3 return
- Thursday, November 5th (B) & Monday, November 9th (A): Grades 4 8 (secondary schools start grades 6 8) return
- Monday, November 16th (A) & Thursday, November 19th (B): Grades 9 12 return

Families with students who are prioritized for in-person learning have also been notified of the option for two additional days of in-person learning. Students in this group will begin additional days of hybrid learning on October 13th, based on choice, classroom capacity, and public health data.

"The School Committee is excited to welcome students

and families back as we begin the new school year, and to support the hard work of our school leaders and educators to provide enriching activities and opportunities for students learning remotely and in-person alike,' said Boston School Committee Chairperson Michael Loconto. "In addition to building upon the lessons learned last year about remote learning, we also forward to supporting the district in continuing the steadfast commitment demonstrated this spring and summer to ensuring equitable access to food and adequate technology for remote learning. I also want to thank our City of Boston colleagues for providing timely and comprehensive facilities support to welcome our educators and students back to our school buildings throughout the Fall."

Since the spring school closure, BPS worked with school leaders and teachers to improve the remote learning experience for students and educators. In response to community feedback, all schools will use one of two learning management systems, SeeSaw or Google Classroom, allowing families and students to find all of their learning materials, classes, and assignments in one place. BPS has also provided languagespecific training sessions for families, ensuring that everyone can access online resources with confidence.

ROMANO vs. RAPHAEL

While we are on the theme of Cupid, Psyche, and art, a very interesting story tells us about the community of Mantua in northern Italy, the birthplace of Vergil. He glorified the city's palace in his four books entitled Georgica. This is the work which exhibited such a high artistic perfection in Latin poetry that it confirmed his position as the foremost poet of the "Golden Age of Latin Literati."

Mantua played an important part in the turmoil of the Middle Ages when the Gonzaga's obtained its mastery. This is also when the city attained importance and prosperity. The Gonzaga's were genuine lovers of art and literature, and they made their court a brilliant center of culture, deeds, arts, and letters. One wife of a succeeding Gonzaga was the gentle Isabella d'Este, so wise and accomplished that she was called the first lady in the world. She corresponded with the most eminent men of her time, charmed all hearts and her requests were never refused. Whatever activity she undertook was well done and her high spirits never failed her. As a great connoisseur of art, she collected books, gems, rare brocades, musical instruments, paintings, and other works with which she decorated her apartment. It was appropriately called "Il Paradiso."

The Gonzaga's also built a summer residence, which they called "Palazzo Del Te." Here, they decorated the walls with sensational and occasionally indelicate mythological and allegorical frescoes that were designed by Giulio Romano and executed by his pupils. One room, for example, shows the notorious "Fall of the Giants." Colossal figures are shown crushed between enormous masses of rock. Another chamber's frescoes relate the story of Psyche as told by Apuleius in The Golden Ass. Here, however, the incidents in that fable are illustrated with every variety of fantasy and insolence that freedom permitted. In spite of their erotic nature, the compositions are important, not only for a study of the life and manners of the people who frequented the residence, but for the influence that those pictures exercised on future art.

Another very interesting series on this same subject is located in Rome's Farnese Palace. The structure was started in 1500 A.D., giving Michelangelo, Giacomo della Porta, and Antonio da Sangallo an opportunity to contribute to its design. The owner of the palace was a banker, an enthusiastic admirer of the arts, and patron of Raphael. The ceiling of one large vestibule contains twelve fascinating frescoes displaying the same famous fable of Cupid and Psyche, but here it is told in a manner that is most graceful in conception and treatment. The entire composition was designed and started by Raphael but completed by his pupils. This work is rated on a par with the most charming creations of the master. The scenes are neither coarse nor sensual; a nobility of proportion which never oversteps the bounds of refinement. This, of course, explains why most people know Raphael for the great master that he was, while at the same time think of Romano, as a distributor of grated cheese. The next time you get to Rome you must visit the Farnese Palace — that's an order.

The Sinking of the USS Indianapolis

One of the last naval disasters of WWII is ultimately a tale of courage and heroism. In the immediate aftermath of the war the story was buried by the dropping of the A-bomb, the end of the war and the return home, the unification of the American family and the growth of suburbia, and, the Cold War ultimately leading us into another war in southeast Asia. But, thanks in part to Steven Spielberg's brief but tense reference to the tragedy in Jaws, the torpedoing of the USS Indianapolis has earned its place in the annals of WWII heroism.

The *Indianapolis* had been used extensively in the Pacific during the war and in July of 1945, it was assigned its most vital mission yet; delivering parts of "Little Boy," the atomic bomb that would be dropped on Hiroshima to the United States Army Air Force Base on the island of Tinian. Its mission completed on the 26th of that month, the battleship made a stop at Guam and then began its way toward the Philippines to prepare for the invasion of Japan. On board were 1,196

On July 30, the Indianapolis was suddenly hit by two Type 95 torpedoes from the Japanese submarine *I-58* commandeered by Commander Mochitsura Hashimoto. The damage was catastrophic and the ship was doomed. It rolled over, the stern lifted pointing upward and in a little over ten minutes it sank in the warm waters of the South Pacific taking about 300 of the

crew down.

The 896 survivors found themselves adrift in hostile shark-infested waters with too few lifeboats to accommodate them all. For three days the men suffered starvation, dehydration, shark attacks, and no reprieve from the blistering sun. Finally, on August 2nd, an antisubmarine plane doing patrol of the waters spotted the men adrift. Pilots Lt. Chuck Gwinn and Lt. Warren Colwell immediately dropped a life raft and radio transmitter. All rescue units available were dispatched to the area. Lt. Commander Robert Adrian Marks arrived first on the amphibious patrol plane PBY-Catalina. He immediately dropped raft but one was destroyed by the drop while others drifted too far out of reach. Marks and his crew made the decision to disobey orders and land the plane in the water. This decision enabled them to rescue 56 of the men. At night, seven rescue ships arrived picking up the remaining survivors. Of the 896 men adrift only 316 lived to be rescued, the majority of them succumbing to hypothermia or dehydration as well as shark attacks (though its unclear how many men were killed by sharks and how many were left to be eaten after dying from exposure to the elements).

After the dropping of the A-bomb, President Truman kept the story of the sinking of the Indianapolis and the rescue a

news of Japan's surrender.

Nonetheless, inquiries were made (mostly internal) about the Navy's failure to respond. The officer in charge of tracking the *Indianapolis*, Lieutenant Stuart B. Gibson was held accountable for failing to investigate the ship's whereabouts upon knowing it was overdue at its destination. However, taking the brunt of the blame was

the captain, Charles B. McVay

III, who would become the

only captain court-martialed

for losing a ship during WWII in November of 1945. He was

cleared of the charge of failing

to order his men to abandon

ship, but the charge of hazard-

ing the ship by failing to zigzag

through the waters stuck. The

Navy likely knew it would be a

difficult case to make and, as

has been suspected by some of

the survivors, may have been

using McVay as a scapegoat

for its own miscalculations of

the voyage and its dangers. As

per the Navy's order, zigzagging

through the waters was left

at McVay's discretion and he

was never warned of the pres-

him. In the end, Fleet Admiral

Chester Nimitz remitted the

ing from the survivors, McVay

was haunted by the tragedy,

guilt, and traumatized by the

ordeal for the rest of his life. He

committed suicide in 1968 at




L'Anno Bello: A Year in Italian Folklore

Light, Dark and the Season of Michaelmas

Obviously, advice on gatherings and reunions contained within are not applicable to this current time when social distancing (and mask wearing!) is the best practice. Please read these articles as a testament to the joy and love that imbues Italian celebrations — and as suggestions for ways to spend time in the future once this pandemic is finally over.



Around this time a few years ago, my husband helped me bake a pumpkin bread for a family dinner. The smell of quintessential autumn spices cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves - mingled together in the air as we stirred pumpkin puree, as bright as any Halloween decoration, into a sweet mix of flour and brown sugar. The recipe yielded a delicious bread, perfectly moist and studded with chocolate chips for extra richness. However, the pungent aroma and seasonal taste are not the only parts of this bread that I remember, as I also cherish the visual memory of making it. My husband and I baked after the sun had disappeared under the horizon and the last dusky light of the evening dissipated. As the kitchen lamp filled our surroundings with a cozy, honeyed glow, the sky outside the window was black and velvety. This combination of the fairy-tale darkness outside and the warmth of the kitchen wonderfully captured the essence of fall, a season when the longer night hours beckon us indoors and the slight chill of twilight ushers us into the comfort of home and hearth. As the autumn equinox passes, the balance tips in favor of the night and there are more hours of darkness than light. While some may grumble about this, I find that this darkness helps us quiet down, appreciate the current season, and look forward with hope to the return of the light during the winter solstice. Europeans have long been celebrating a holiday that marks this period of transition — Michaelmas — and it continues to wield inspiration even today.

Michaelmas occurs on September 29th, and it is the feast day of St. Michael the Archangel. In his iconography, St. Michael often appears holding scales, and during his feast day the scales are particularly reminiscent of the balance between light and dark that characterizes the period around the autumn equinox. Indeed, Michaelmas celebrations acquired a seasonal quality throughout Europe, and served as harvest festivals marked by special dishes. Roast goose forms the backbone of the English Michaelmas, where superstition dictates that whoever eats goose on this feast day will enjoy money all year long. Carrots, an autumnal

root vegetable, were instead the food of choice among medieval Scots on Michaelmas, along with oat cakes known as bannocks. Italy also abounds with Michaelmas traditions and lore. There, St. Michael's Day, or la Festa di San Michele l'Arcangelo, functions as the gateway to fall, a harbinger of colder weather, darker nights, and the start of the school year. Numerous proverbs, left over from the agricultural past, speak to the importance of St. Michael's Day as a seasonal milestone in Italy. The adage "San Michele, l'uva é come il miele" means that grapes are as sweet as honey on St. Michael's Day, since the holiday occurs during the time when Italians harvest the ripened grapes from their vineyards. Another dictum states that "a San Michele, il calore va in cielo," which when translated literally says that the heat departs for the sky on Michaelmas — in other words, cooler weather begins now. These customs and proverbs remind me that in Italy saints' days are deeply woven into the tapestry of everyday life, imbuing agriculture and weather with a deeper resonance. They make me think of the small white church dedicated to St. Michael in my father's hometown of Sulmona, a center of community that embodies much of the homey essence of this holiday.

As a seasonal turning point, Michaelmas grants us the opportunity to respect and honor the darkness of autumnal nights. Though I sometimes find the early nighttime of the fall to be spooky, I also appreciate it for the unique insights it affords and its place in the cycle of the year. When shadowy skies summon me indoors, I seize on the chance to develop my hobby of baking, making the most of fall's produce as I stand in my golden, warm kitchen. As my home brims with the flavors of the season, from tart apples to creamy pumpkins to juicy pears, I am thankful to provide such comfort food to my loved ones. I even have a special Michaelmas recipe soft and spicy gingersnap cookies, as ginger is connected to the medieval celebrations of this holiday and frequently lined the stalls of harvest fairs that dotted the countryside of olden Europe. The autumnal darkness also instills in me a love of mystery, a longing for

the lure of the unexplained and the indelible feeling of telling spooky stories and eerie legends around a crackling fire. How different would Halloween celebrations be without the sense of shivering anticipation and wonder of the unknown that accompany long, dark nights! Finally, the dim fall evenings give me a renewed appreciation for the light. I relish every bit of autumn sunshine, particularly at day's close, when the sun's last gilded rays shine through the colorful leaves, crafting them into a kaleidoscope of fiery hues. This desire for light breaking through the darkness forms the symbolic backbone of upcoming winter holidays that feature candles or honor the rebirth of the sun, such as Advent, St. Lucy's Day, Hanukkah, Christmas, Kwanzaa and New Year's Eve. Michaelmas, therefore, taps into a primordial desire in the human consciousness as it expresses the simultaneous need for darkness and hope for a shining future.

Autumn provides us with a whole calendar of celebrations as well as lovely images to mark the season. Bright red and orange leaves swirl down from treetops like celestial feathers, carpeting the ground in a mosaic of multihued patterns. The harvest of crops like apples and pumpkins not only remind us of the Earth's abundant bounty, but also inspire people to joyfully express gratitude in the forms of fairs and applepicking excursions. However, while we are often quick to revel in the pleasures of foliage and pumpkin patches, we often treat dark autumn nights with disdain. A new perspective will let us see the many benefits the short days of fall have to offer. This darkness encourages us to seek the company of family and friends, to spend time developing our interests, and to reflect on the things for which we are the most grateful. It opens our eyes to the mysteries of the world. Moreover, it shows to appreciate the light, which we often take for granted. The holiday of Michaelmas reflects this balance between light and dark and, through its myriad symbolic connotations in Italy and elsewhere, teaches us that both are necessary components of the year's enduring journey. So let us take these lessons of Michaelmas to heart, and find peace in the darkness as we yearn for the



Rise is a digital photograph taken at sunrise in February 2020, at Lake Baikal, Siberia. It is a mesmerizing place as it engulfs you in its frozen embrace. The sound and feel of the ice play with the senses in strange ways. To answer the obvious ... yes, it was cold. Conti was prepared for that. What threw him off was the raw, stark feel of the environment and the eerie, unsettling sounds of the near endless sheet of ice. The ice is frozen several meters down despite the appearance of deep cracks. Lake Baikal is located about three hours drive from Irkutsk in eastern Russia. the lake contains approximately one-quarter of the world's liquid fresh water, about a mile deep, 400 miles long and 50 miles wide.

The live exhibition runs through October 25, 2020. The gallery is open Wednesday through Saturday, noon to 4:00 p.m. Plymouth Center for the Arts, 11 North Street, Plymouth, MA 02360 (social distancing and masks required). The annual Art Stroll will be on October 3, 2020, 10:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

Saint Charles Houben

Charles was born Joannes Andreas Houben on December 11, 1821, in the village of Munstergeleen in the Kingdom of the Netherlands, to Peter Joseph Houben and his wife, Johanna Elizabeth Luyten. One of 11 children in a poor family, he was a slow learner in his youth. To those outside his family he seemed quiet and extremely shy.

When Charles was 19 years old he was enrolled for military service in the First Infantry Regiment of the Netherlands. On February 18, 1845, his period as a reservist in the army

came to an end and he was formally discharged.

Feeling called to religious life, in 1845 Charles was admitted to the novitiate of the Passionists, who had recently arrived in Belgium, in the village of Ere, near Tournai. He professed his religious vows the following year and was given the religious habit and the religious name of Charles of St. Andrew. His father died in 1850, just before Charles' ordination as a priest which occurred on December 21, 1850.

He was appointed to the Passionists' new English foundation in 1852. In July 1857, Charles was transferred to Ireland to the newly founded monastery of Mount Argus, in Harold's Cross, Dublin.

Charles was not a good preacher. He never really mastered the English language, but it was in the confessional and in comforting the sick that he excelled, and he became fond of the Irish people. Following the example of Blessed Dominic Barbieri, an apostle of Ecumenism, Charles worked hard for the good of souls and the unity of the Church. It was Charles' gift of healing the sick which is most clearly remembered.

Charles was transferred back to England in 1866 and remained there for eight years.

Charles returned to Dublin in 1874. A wagon in which he was travelling overturned near St Clare's Convent at Harold's Cross, causing a fracture which never set right. He remained in Dublin until his death on January 5, 1893.

Charles was beatified by Pope John Paul II on October 16, 1988 and canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on June 3, 2007. The Feast Day of Saint Charles Houben is January 5th.

Do Dogs Have Emotions? Of Course They Do!

Having a dog, you probably already recognize your dog's emotions by paying attention to his/her body language, facial expressions, the noises they make, and their movements. Because of the unique relationship between humans and dogs (having lived together for thousands of years), we are especially good at recognizing their emotions, and dogs are good at showing us when they are excited, happy, sad, frustrated, or anxious. After all, it's the unique ways in which our dog expresses himself that show us how truly one-of-a-kind he or she really is! Although we have reason to believe that dogs lead rich emotional lives, it is very hard to quantify or measure the depth of these emotions. In fact, dog emotions are the topic of a great deal of research around the world. What is understood is that all mammals, dogs included, have basic emotional systems that help them to fulfill their needs. Such as a seeking system to look for food, a fear system to respond to unfamiliar events that may be dangerous, a care system to help them raise offsprings (and form bonds with their human companions) and a play system to help them learn about social etiquette and their environment. Emotions are, in fact essential to how animals



learn, which is why dogs learn best when training sessions are done in a positive and playful manner. Emotionality in dogs: the emotional lives of our furry friends can be quite complex. Dogs have behavioral tendencies or personalities, which are relatively consistent throughout their lives. This is something that dogs are born with and serves as the foundation for their moods and emotions. Just like humans, dogs have moods that can last for hours or days. Good events in a dog's life help establish a good mood and bad events will establish a bad mood.

Emotions on the other hand, are specific reactions to an event that last for seconds or minutes. Like moods, emotions may be

divided into positive and negative feelings and have rising or decreasing scales depending on how good or how bad the event was for the dog. Animals with behavior problems often display extreme emotions at the time they demonstrate their problem behavior. A Nostalgic Remembrance



When I was a young boy, occasionally Dad would bring us to Revere Beach for the day. He would pack us up in his old '37 Plymouth and we would head out. My father loved the beach, but working day and night, he didn't have much time to enjoy the things he liked to do. On this particular day, he invited Nanna and Babbononno to come along. They weren't the beach type, but for some reason, never to be known, Babbononno was enthusiastic about going and Nanna packed a lunch for us to take along. When we arrived at the beach, Dad lucked out and found a parking space right away and within minutes he was spreading out a giant-sized army blanket for all to sit on. It was at that point Nanna discovered that no one had taken the basket filled with her food. Dad told her not to worry, because when it was time to eat, there was a Joe and Nemo restaurant across the street and lunch would be on him.

What made me think back about this outing was an email I received from an old friend, named "Manny." Manny, like yours truly, is an alumnus of English High, and I was on a couple of his reunion committees a while back headed by him. Due to a conversation we had after a meeting, Manny emailed a detailed history of Joe and Nemo restaurants, which at one time, were in many locations in or near Boston. Actually, they weren't restaurants; they were hotdog stands. Sorry Nathan's of Coney Island and New York City, you couldn't hold a candle to Joe and Nemo hotdogs.

Dad, Babbononno, and I basked in the sun, but Nanna and Mom had to cover up as they had very light skin and burned easily. We romped in and out of the water playing in the waves, which at times, could be pretty good at Revere Beach. Before you knew it, it was time to eat and Dad and I headed across the street to where the amusements were and the little stand that said Joe and Nemo above it. When it was Dad's turn to order, I heard him talk to the man behind the counter in code, "I would like twelve dogs, all around and no ends, plus five Cokes." The only thing I understood was Cokes, but the counterman understood and began the task he agreed to. He opened a steamer, brought out twelve hotdog rolls, laced the inside bottom with chopped up onions, streamed some green relish across them, opened another steamer, dropped a hotdog atop each mix, and then lathered the top of the dogs with mustard. I watched in fascination. The Coke came out of a machine and cups were filled and covered. Dad carried the dogs and I the sodas as we retraced our steps and headed back to the blanket where Mom, Nanna, and Babbononno waited in anticipation.

Neither Babbononno nor Nanna had ever eaten Joe and Nemo dogs. My grandfather sniffed at the lunch that was

handed to him, shrugged and took a bite. The next thing I heard from him, "Oooh, questo e buono." (Oh, this is good.) Nanna just nodded and ate. Each of us (five people) had two dogs each and there were two left, seeing Dad bought a dozen. Everybody looked at each other and Dad took the hint. He gave the two dogs to Nanna and Babbononno and said, "Come on," (to me) and we headed back across the street and returned with three more hotdogs all around and no ends. He, Mom, and I consumed our third helping of Joe and Nemo dogs, and, at that point, Mom came out with what a mother would normally say considering the location and the circumstance, "You can't go in the water for an hour after you eat, or you will get a cramp and drown!" I counted the minutes.

As the years passed, I discovered several Joe and Nemo stands located throughout Boston. After ordering a dog at one of them as a young adult, I learned what "no ends" meant. The buns were baked in a slab with the two end ones having a crust. The center ones had no crust and "no ends" meant a bun from the inside of the bunch. Of course, all around meant onion, relish, and mustard as the garnishes.

When I was in my late teens, I became a professional musician, and when I booked a job, I used two local musicians, Tony Poto on piano, and Rocky Freni on drums. Tony was the only one with a car, but one Saturday, he told us his car was in the shop for repairs. Rocky's father offered to drive us to work and pick us up with his 1958 Packard station wagon. The car had enough room for the four of us, my bass violin, Rocky's drums, and Tony's music.

The job went well if I remember correctly and Rocky's father was outside at midnight, as planned. While driving us home, he yelled out, "I'm hungry, would anyone like to stop for some "nightmares?" When I asked what he meant, he said, "Nightmares ... Joe and Nemo hotdogs." We all agreed and Mr. Freni headed for Revere Beach. It was a cold winter's night and at that hour, the Joe and Nemo stand was the only place open. They had a special, seeing it was winter, three hotdogs for a quarter. No, this is not a misprint. The special was three hotdogs for twenty-five cents. When it was my turn to order, I told the man behind the counter what I wanted, "Three dogs all around and no ends." Mr. Freni velled out, "So, you know, that's good!"

From Manny's email, I discovered the history of Joe and Nemo. Joe Merlino, a first generation Italian American owned a barbershop on Stoddard Street, just across Howard Street and the Old Howard Theater, America's first burlesque house. His friend, Izzy Shenker sold hot dogs just outside his shop from a steam kettle. Tiring of barbering, Joe bought a barroom located next to the barbershop and invited Izzy to move inside. When Izzy retired, Joe brought in Tony Caloggero, who had worked for him in the barbershop to take Izzy's place. Tony's nickname was Nemo, and the two men decided to name the business after themselves. And so, Joe and Nemo was born.

When prohibition hit, the two men had to close the bar. To make up for lost business, they opened a Joe and Nemo on Stoddard Street, near the entrance of the Old Howard. They were rather successful and opened several other small hotdog stands in other parts of the city. After the repeal of prohibition, Joe and Nemo applied for and received the first liquor license issued in Boston.

Like most empires, Joe and Nemo rose to great heights, and then fell. The last one I remember (and this was a few years ago) was located on Bowdoin Street, just around the corner from Boston's Government Center, the location that once had been part of the infamous Scollay Square. The Old Howard closed in 1953, and then burned down a while later. The West End was torn down as well as Scollay Square beginning a decade later, and soon, Joe and Nemo became part of history and the folklore of Boston's "good old days." When the sights and scents of apples are in the air, this lets us know that fall is finally here! Apple orchards in Northern Italy as well as here in New England are filled with trees having some of the season's most succulent varieties. Italian Nonna's (grandmothers) anxiously wait for this time of year to make delicious pies, pastries, and desserts from a variety of these mele (apples). Most Nonna's tend to use their own favorite recipes for most of their creations. However, when it comes to making Torta di Mele (Apple Cake), they typically prefer to use their family's recipe that has more often than not been passed down through the generations. Unlike American apple cakes that are mainly batter and spices, Italian tortas are all about the apples, and contain very little batter. The main ingredients are usually apples, sugar, flour, oil or butter, eggs, leavening agent, and essences.

My grandparents had a Golden Delicious apple tree in their backyard. Each year when the apples came into season, my Nonna and I would pick them, place them in a bushel, and store them in the cold wine cellar. We'd then use them when making crostatas and apple squares, assorted desserts, and of course, Torta di Mele (apple cakes). I shared one of my favorite torta recipes last year. This year, I am sharing one of my Nonna's that she simply called her Torta di Mele Siciliana (Sicilian Apple Cake). This torta has very little batter but is loaded with fresh apples, walnuts and raisins. The combination of fruits and nuts, along with butter, sugar and spices, truly results in an amazingly moist and delicious cake. Perfect to serve for breakfast on a cool fall morning, or even alongside a cup of coffee or shot of espresso, in the late afternoon. Nonna Mary's Torta di Mele Sicilian's is best when served slightly warm, and simply delightful when paired with a scoop of vanilla gelato, or a dollop of fresh whipped cream!

NONNA MARY'S SICILIAN APPLE CAKE Torta di Mele Siciliana di Nonna Maria




- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 ½ teaspoons baking soda
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 ½ teaspoons cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon allspice or pinch of nutmeg and pinch of cloves
- (optional) 1 cup (2 sticks) butter, softened
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- 3 eggs
- 4 ½ cups apples (Cortland, Honey crisp, or Granny Smith), peeled and cut into 1-1 ½ inch pieces
- 1 1/4 1 1/2 cups chopped
- ½ cup raisins (soaked in rum for 20 minutes and drained, optional)

Preheat oven to 325°. Grease and flour a 10-inch tube pan, set aside.

In a medium mixing bowl, sift together flour, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and additional spices, if desired and set aside.

In a large mixing bowl, cream together butter and sugar, add vanilla and mix well. Add eggs one at a time, beating after each addition. Slowly add dry flour mixture and mix together well. Fold in apples, then walnuts and raisins. Mixture will be very thick. Using a spatula, place evenly into prepared tube pan. Bake 11/2 hours or until toothpick/skewer comes out clean yet slightly moist. Do not overcook.



The Night the Referee Hit Back

Memorable Moments from the World of Boxing

Review: The Night the Referee Hit Back

By Mike Silver ~ Forward by Teddy Atlas ~ Rowman & Littlefield Publishers, Inc.

Mike Silver has been deeply involved with boxing for well over half a century. He started as a kid training in the legendary Stillman's Gym, served on the New York State Boxing Commission, and even took a crack at promoting fights. Where he has left an indelible mark is with his writing about the sport. His book The Arc Of Boxing: The Rise And Decline Of The Sweet Science is the finest book ever written on how the fine art of boxing has regressed to something that is all but unrecognizable today.

He followed that up with Stars In The Ring: Jewish Champions In The Golden Age Of Boxing: A Photographic History, a detailed

look back on the history of Jewish fighters that includes the period when boxing was very much a Jewish sport.

Mike has also penned hundreds of interesting and at times controversial articles for many boxing publications and web sites (Note: Mike Silver is a frequent contributor to *Boxing Over Broadway*).

In his latest book, *The Night The Referee Hit Back*, Mr. Silver brings us a selection of those essays along with a number of interviews with some of the last of the old school bovers.

of the old school boxers. Thumbing through the pages of this volume is like getting an advance degree in boxing theory. Mike brings you back to the days of the real boxing gyms in his opening piece, Boxing In Olde New York: Unforgettable Stillman's Gym. He not only knows the history of this iconic establishment, he was actually there when it was in full swing. You can smell the cigar smoke and hear the tattooing on the speed bags. With his pen (or keyboard) Mike paints a word picture that if it were in a frame would be a George Bellows lithograph.


Mike Silver is not one to shy away from controversy and he holds strong opinions. You may not always agree with him, in fact he may get your blood pressure to rise, but you cannot fault him for not putting forth very strong arguments in defense of his positions.

Among the articles that have raised a few eyebrows is *The Myth Of The Thriller In Manilla*. Mike is not afraid to go against the conventional wisdom that this was an all-time great fight, and rather makes the point that if this was a fight between two guys named Smith and Jones instead of Ali and Frazier it would have been seen as what it really was; a good brawl between two shot and over the hill fighters. He makes plenty of other arguments in defense of his opinion but I will leave those for the readers to explore on their own. Agree or disagree, you will be fascinated by what he has to say.

Three essays hold significant historical importance; Don't Blame Ruby: A Boxing Tragedy Revisited, where the author looks at the third Emile Griffith vs Benny Kid Paret fight and what the true cause of Paret's death was. A lot more went on here than is generally believed, and Ruby Goldstein was falsely scapegoated by those who were looking for easy answers.

In Foul Play In Philly, Mike makes a connection between what happened the night Rocky Marciano won the title from Jersey Joe Walcott and the evening in Miami when Cassius Clay defeated Sonny Liston. Reading this piece is like looking at a deposition for a trial, and I can tell you, Mike would have been a very convincing witness for the prosecution.

The third historically significant article is *Ali*



Vs Shavers: The Morning After. In many ways this is a sad one to read as in it Mike lays out facts of just how many terrible head shots Ali took from Shavers that night. If Muhammad wasn't already damaged enough to ensure he would suffer from CET a few years later, this but certainly sealed his fate.

There are many more gems in this collection that include stories about people as varied as Teddy Roosevelt, Woody Allen, a kangaroo, and Marlon Brando. All make for an enjoyable journey through the sport of boxing.

As great as the essays are, Mike really shifts into high gear with his interviews of boxers of the past. Not only does this

selection include great fighters, but also boxers who are deep thinkers about the profession. They were active in the period from the 1930s to the

1970s, a huge part of the Golden Age of Boxing. What makes these conversations even more enlightening is the fact that Mike Silver knows what questions to ask. These aren't just simple question and answer sessions but rather more along the lines of a Brian Lamb interview in that Mike knows how to prod the fighters into opening up about their thoughts on what it took

of their toughest opponents.

The fighters Mike spoke to were Archie Moore, Carlos Ortiz, Tiger Ted Lowry, Curtis Cokes, and Emile Griffith. The insights contained in these conversations are priceless. Ted Lowry talks about his controversial loss in his first fight with Rocky Marciano, his exhibition match with Joe Louis, and what it was like being a black soldier in the segregated military during World War Two.

to be a skilled fighter and how they viewed some

Archie Moore describes what it was like to fight Charley Burley, "He was like a threshing machine going back and forth." and the importance of practicing moves in front of a mirror. Moore also gives a list of the ingredients that go into being a successful fighter. When Mike asks the secret to Archie's boxing longevity, the Old Mongoose responds, "Well, I knew how to fight." He has much more to say about the subject, and every word is fascinating.

Reading his discussions with Carlos Ortiz and Curtis Cokes is like sitting in on a master class on the *Art Of Boxing*. These men are geniuses when it comes to describing the sport they excelled in. The subtleties they talk about show just how much thought went into becoming a good boxer. A couple of examples:

Carlos Ortiz on advice to a young fighter, "Boxing is to hit and not get hit. And if you go into the ring with that thought in mind you'll be OK. But don't go out there to impress the public by showing them how much you can take or how hard a punch you can take. That's not the case in boxing. Boxing is I hit you; you don't hit me, over and over again. It's a skill that you apply."

Curtis Cokes on footwork, "I think today's fighters forget about footwork. I worked everyday on my footwork, turning left and right, backing up, going forward. I turned to my left to be outside of my opponent's right hand, and then I'd swing to my right to be outside of his left jab. Learning how to box is a slow process but you try to learn something everyday."

These comments are much like Shakespeare's advice to actors in Hamlet, when speaking through the Dane; in just a couple of paragraphs he gives

HOOPS and HOCKEY in the HUB by Richard Preiss

It was a big splashy photograph that dominated the back page of the *Boston Herald* some 14 years ago.

But there it was — right there in the middle of summer — in the July 6, 2006 edition - pictorially proclaiming for all to see that prized NHL free agent Zdeno Chara had indeed signed on the dotted line and had taken his place on the roster of the Boston Bruins.

Yes sir, the B's had certainly reeled in a whopper — all 6'-9" dominating dimensions of him — soon after the annual free agency frenzy period had begun. It launched an era that has witnessed some of the most memorable moments in the history of the franchise.

What's also interesting about the photograph is that Chara is flanked by two members of the organization that would not last as long as the big guy. On Chara's right was Bruins interim general manager Jeff Gorton, who had worked in various capacities with the Bruins since 1992. He left in 2007 for the New York Rangers where he is now the general manager. On Chara's left was head coach Dave Lewis who lasted one season before Claude Julien took over.

He had been hired just days before Chara with the blessing of incoming B's GM Peter Chiarelli, who could not contractually take over the Big Chair until July $15^{\rm th}$.

Lewis would be behind the B's bench for only one season — a year in which the team finished last in the Northeast Division with a 35-41-6 record. He would be replaced during the summer of 2007 by Claude Julien.

Even the building's name would change. On the day of Chara's introductory press conference in Boston, the facility was known as the TD Banknorth Garden. That middle name would vanish in July, 2009 when the present name — TD Garden — would be put in place.

But on that happy day depicted in the photograph there were smiles all the way around. July is January in the National Hockey League and this was the equivalent of a New Year's party, minus the garish headgear and the ceremonial dropping of the ball.

Some 20 NHL teams had indicated interest in the all-star defenseman. Indeed, it had been a lengthy road to Boston — one that included four seasons with the New York Islanders and four more with the Ottawa Senators. Somewhere in that itinerary, if you peeked deep enough, there was even a 23-game stretch with the Lowell Lock Monsters during the 1998-1999 season.

But after becoming eligible for free agency, the big payday had arrived at last with the B's finally opening the vault and delivering a five-year, \$37.5 million contract to the one they wanted.

That concluded a bidding competition that was set off when Ottawa determined that for financial reasons it could not resign its two top defensemen — Chara and Wade Redden — to new contracts in the same year. The Sens opted to go with Redden, signing him to a two-year, \$13 million deal, an action that put Chara on the free agent market.

They say that what goes around comes around and thus, in the twilight of his career, Redden would join the Bruins from St. Louis at the trade deadline in April of 2013, reuniting him with Chara for the B's playoff run that concluded with the Bruins losing to Chicago in the Stanley Cup Final. Redden never played pro hockey again after that late June series some seven years ago while Chara has continued onward to this very day.

His career on Causeway Street has become the embodiment of the self-fulfilling prophecy in a positive way. In 2006, he noted why he selected Boston over other franchises.

"You have to go by your heart and I just felt I was making the right decision," Chara stated in the *Herald*. He noted that "it wasn't an easy decision."

In looking toward the future, he believed the Bruins were on the rise, with a number of young players who would "get better and better." Chara was 29 at the time.

And he made certain that he would personally take charge of leading the way. "I'm willing to lead by my example of hard work, dedication, discipline, and drive. I want to put this team on a winning track. Once we have that, I want to be a contender for the Stanley Cup and hopefully a champion."

It took a few years, but over time that all eventually came true. The Bruins improved and went on their memorable Stanley Cup run in 2011, which ended not only in victory but with Chara taking laps around Rogers Arena in Vancouver with the trophy.

Two years later in 2013, the B's would be back for a second lengthy run — one that would see them lose to Chicago in a six-game series that ended at the TD Garden.

But all who witnessed the Bruins in the playoffs that spring will tell you that they were inspirational to watch. The playoffs took place in the months when "Boston Strong" rang out in the wake of the Boston Marathon bombing tragedy. It was widely believed that the Bruins lifted the spirits of the entire city at a time when the Hub needed it most.

And once again last year, in the spring of 2019, Chara led by example. Playing in Game 4 of the Stanley Cup Final against St. Louis, Chara was injured when he took a puck to his face, breaking his jaw in multiple places. He later revealed that he played the last three games of the series with his jaw held together with "two plates, some wires and screws" while consuming a mostly liquid diet.

"He's a warrior," stated teammate Brad Marchand when Chara showed up for action and a standing ovation in the moments leading up to Game 5. It would take nearly two months for him to make a complete recovery.

Since Chara joined the Bruins, the B's have finished over .500 in every regular season except that first one in 2006-2007. They have made the playoffs 11 times since Chara joined the franchise. This past season the team won the Presidents' Trophy.

He's 43 now, but hopes to keep going. "I believe I can still play and contribute to the team," Chara stated in early September. "I want to stay in Boston. I want to be a Boston Bruin."
